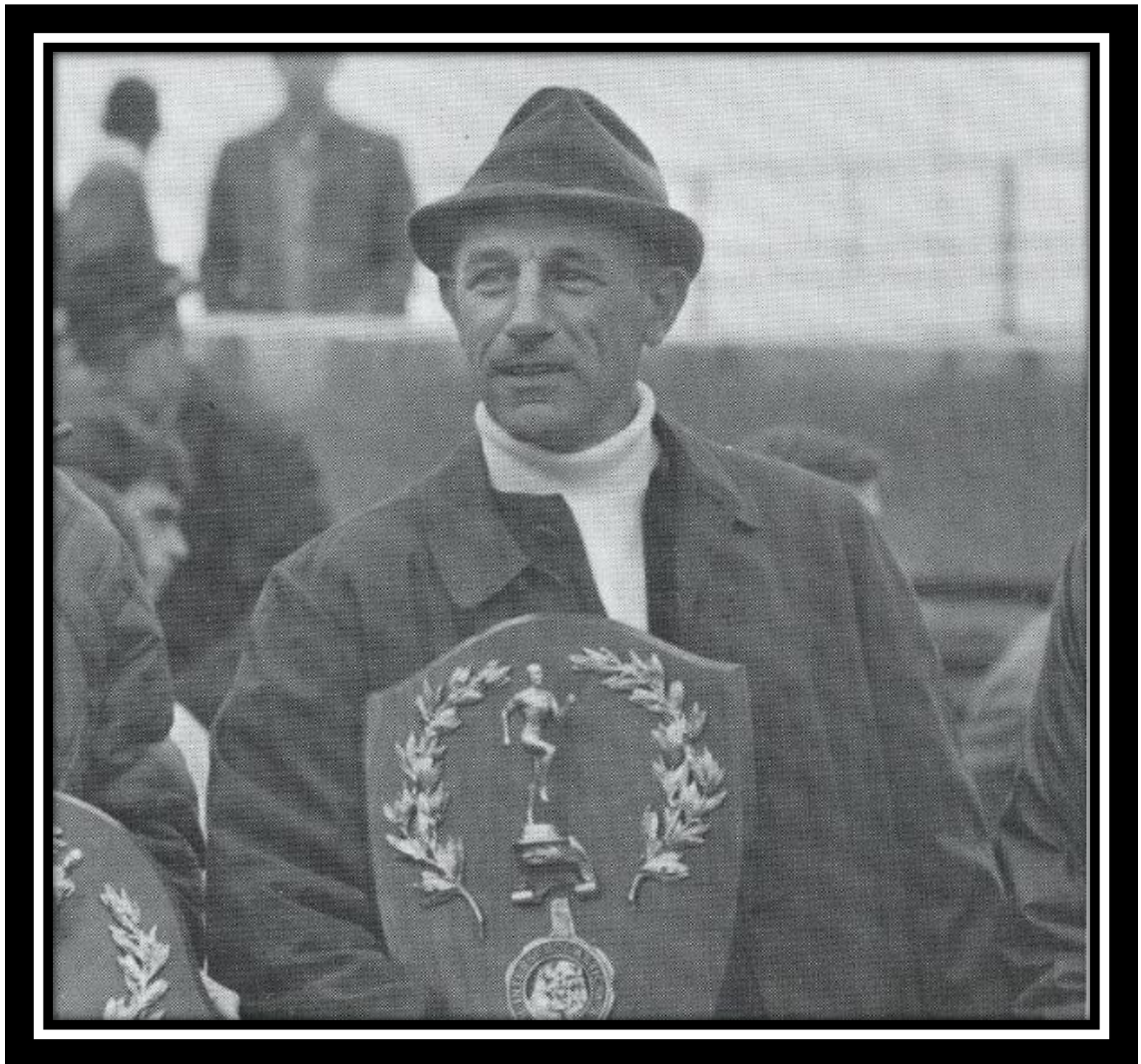

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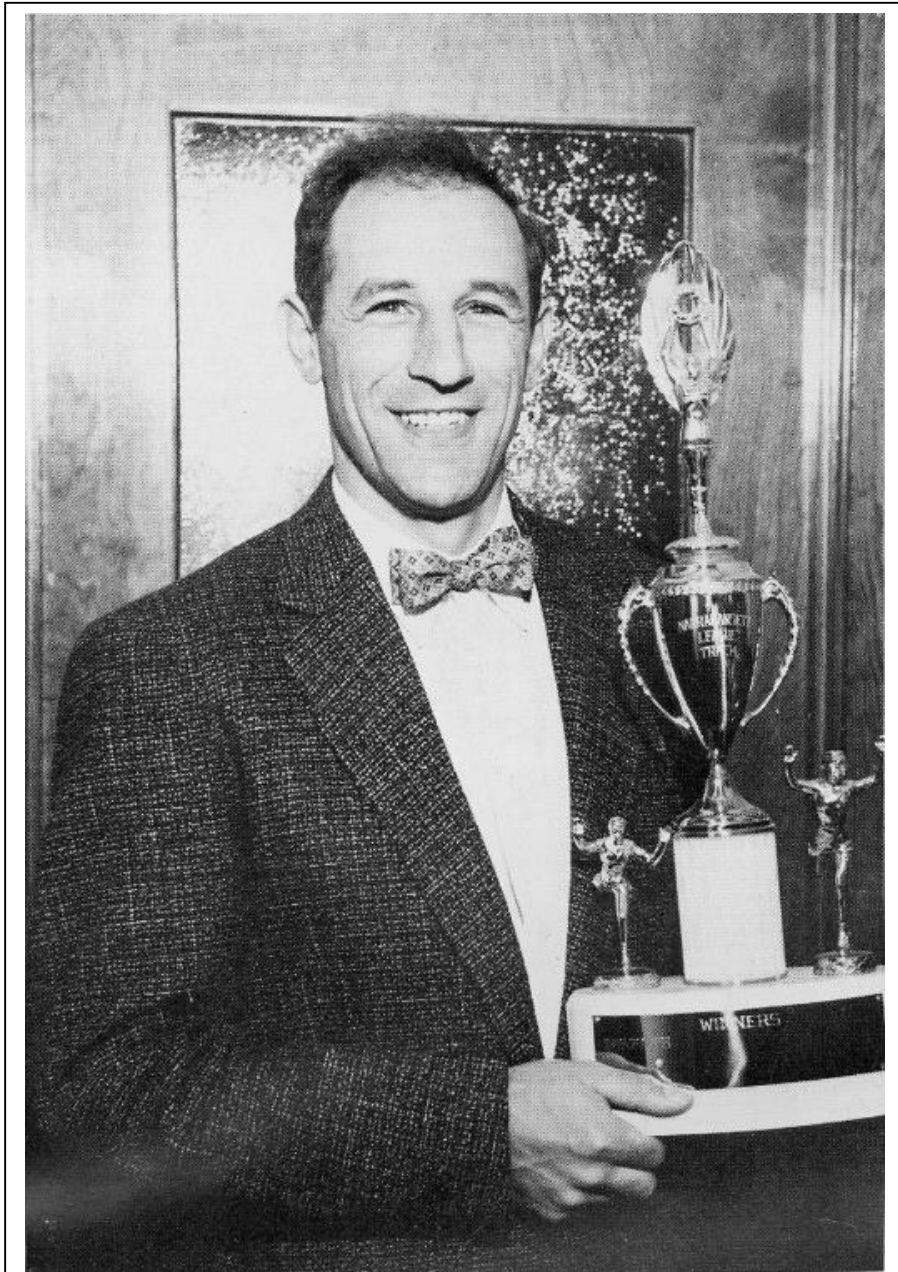
Preface

In 2011 the Concord Historical Society published a history of Concord in the 20th century entitled *Crosscurrents of Change*. The chapter on Athletics and Recreation by Allen Lessels included an excellent and well-deserved article about Bill Luti and his achievements in the running community. Bill's 1963 high school boys cross-country team that recorded a perfect score in the state meet was described. The article was appropriate for this type of history but clearly many good teams and many good individual runners coached by Luti could not be included in such an article. A history of boys' cross-country at Concord High during the Bill Luti Era was needed to provide information about and to document the achievements of the other teams and other individuals coached by Luti. This manuscript is an attempt to contribute to such a history. It presents information about all of Coach Luti's boys cross-country teams. Any runner consistently in the top 10 for a team will be able to find his name listed in the yearly summary sheets in Appendix A and in tables C-4 and C-5 in Appendix C. Names and places of all runners participating in state and New England races are provided in the Comments sections of Appendix A as well as tables B-1 and B-2 in Appendix B.

Sources used to research information for this document include: Concord High School yearbooks (as available in the Concord Room of the Concord Public Library), Concord Monitor articles (as available on Microfilm at the Concord Library), personal papers of Coach Luti including the actual scoring sheets as well as historical documents about both the state and New England races, and personal communications with Coach Luti. When discrepancies arose among sources, Luti's personal results were generally used. In at least one case (9/14/79 race), Luti noticed a slight scoring error after the season was completed. It was only a couple of points and didn't affect the outcome of the race but Bill, ever the stickler for details and accuracy, made the changes in his papers. The corrected numbers, which are slightly different from what was reported in the paper, were used here. The accuracy of the numbers reported in this document can be no greater than that of the references used, but any mistakes are the author's.

This report is only about the boys cross-country teams coached by Bill Luti. It is not a history of cross-country at Concord High although some historical information is presented. It does not include his other coaching and organizing activities. It does not include girls cross-country although the beginning of girls running at Concord is discussed. It does not include Brady cross-country although the rivalry between the two schools in the late sixties is described. It does not include his girls spring track coaching, his girls cross-country coaching nor his work in the Concord running community. It does not include his founding of the Turtletown Athletic Club, his organizing and running of the mini-marathon race nor the Bill Luti 5-Miler, although the latter race is discussed and its 40th anniversary is celebrated. It is not a biography of Coach Luti although personal information is included and his coaching methods are detailed. It is more about the boys on his cross-country teams and the influence he had on their successes than about Coach himself.

The report is primarily a factual and verifiable account of results but it does include some remembrances, observations and conclusions by the author. In the interest of full disclosure, the author ran for Coach Luti from 1961 to 1963. His conclusions may show a bias for the early sixties teams because of his better knowledge and understanding of those teams and their performances.

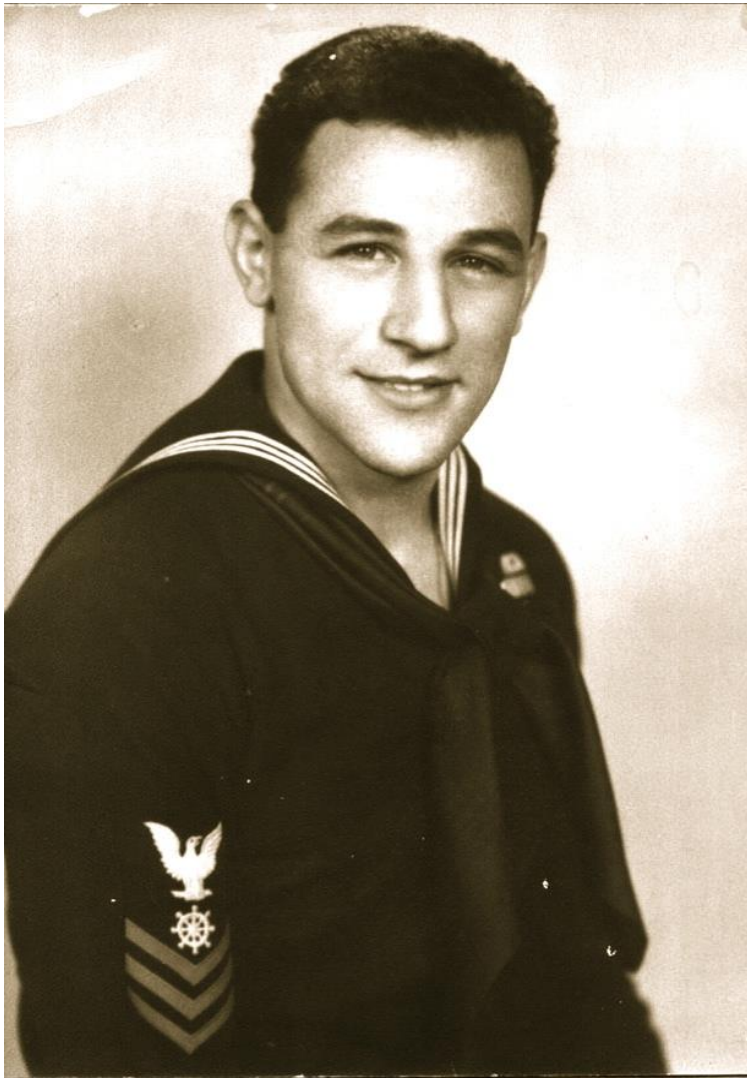


Coach Bill Luti in Somerset, MA in 1955, prior to moving to Concord High School in 1957

Bill Luti

Bill Luti coached the boys' cross-country teams at Concord High School for 25 years, from the 1957 through the 1981 cross-country seasons. During that time he amassed 13 undefeated seasons, 13 state titles and 3 state runner-ups, 4 New England titles and 4 New England runner-ups and a record of 238 wins, 26 losses and 1 tie. He also coached 5 individual state champions, one of whom won two titles, and two New England champions. He was New Hampshire Coach of the Year for boys cross-country in 1973. Who was Bill Luti and why was he so successful? Let's meet the man, his teams and his successes.

William Vincent Luti was born on November 13, 1921 in his grandmother's house in Everett, MA. His parents lived in Franklin, NH at the time so he can lay claim to being a NH native. He moved to Massachusetts when he was about six and lived in several towns in the Boston area as he grew up. He went to Middleboro High School (MA) where he high jumped, pole vaulted and long jumped for the track team – and occasionally ran a leg on the 4

by 400 meter relay team. The school did not have cross-country. One of his ambitions in high school was to become a cartoonist. His drawing talents were often on display during his coaching career – from a hand-drawn map of the old cross-country course with stick-figured runners encountering such obstacles as Coronary Ridge (the ridge out of White Park) or Suction Cup Hill (Forest St. hill) (see p. 35 for drawing of White Park course) to cover illustrations on his end-of-the-year summary reports he provided to his runners (p. 34). (see also p. 36 for another example of his artistic talents).

He was a second generation Italian immigrant. His family was from the Tuscany region of Italy and his grandfather was the first generation to come to the U.S., after first going to Brazil. Bill graduated from Middleboro High in 1939. Most depression era kids, especially sons of immigrants, didn't even think of college. As Bill wrote, they were supposed to "geddajob" and help out the family. After graduating he became an employee of the Northeast Packing Company, a pork processing outfit in Boston's North End where his father

was in charge of the cutting room. He worked from 6:30 to 5:30 except on Saturday when they quit about 12:30. He worked on the 3rd floor where fat trimmings were rendered into lard. The hours were long, the work was hard and non-stop and his future was bleak. The present was unbearable and he saw no future or way out of the situation until his high school buddy said “Let’s join the Navy”. To Bill it was as if the sun had burst through a dark cloud. He saw a future **and** he would be serving his country.

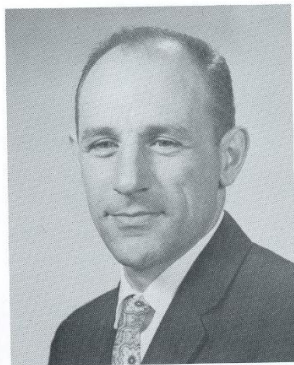


He signed up with the Navy on November 4, 1940. This was the major event in his life that determined his future career. He became a Quartermaster First Class and saw action, initially in the North Atlantic, Caribbean and Canal Zone and later in the Pacific. In 1943 he was transferred to the USS Yorktown (CV10), named in honor of the Yorktown sunk in 1942 at the Battle of Midway. From 1943 through 1945 he was involved in many actions to push the Japanese out of the islands and back to their mainland. His ship was attacked and hit by Japanese torpedo planes and some nearby ships were sunk.

In 1946 his 6-year enlistment was nearing an end. He was promoted to Warrant Bos’n and sent stateside for further assignment. A stateside physical revealed that he had TB (tuberculosis). He was hospitalized for a year, much of it spent at a “country club” facility outside Los Angeles. On Valentine’s Day in 1946 he married his “one and only Marjorie Barnes” in the hospital chapel. A couple of months later

he was discharged from the Navy, rated 100% disabled by the VA with a work tolerance of zero.

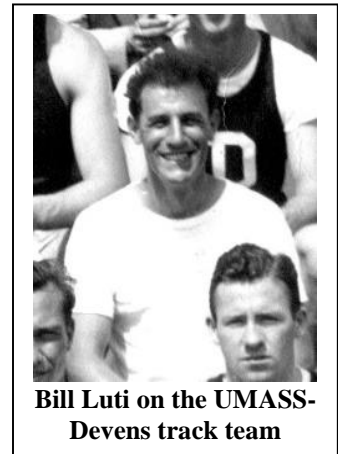
In 1946 he took advantage of the GI Bill to attend the University of Massachusetts, Class of 1950. His first two years were spent at Fort Devens (the Amherst campus couldn’t accommodate all the GIs leaving the military and heading to college so the state used the buildings at Devens to teach and house the students). He pole vaulted for the track team while in college (so much for the Navy’s designation of 100% disabled!).

He graduated in 1950 with a BA in English and an MS in Education. He took a job at Somerset High School in Massachusetts where he taught English and did some coaching.

Bill was hired by Concord High School in 1957 to become a physical education teacher and cross-country, JV basketball and assistant track coach. He knew little about cross-country at the time. He didn’t know that the low score won or that only the top 5 runners scored. But he knew the system he wanted to use – what he called ‘progressive resistance’. Much as a weight lifter gradually adds weights to his lifts as he trains, runners add additional intervals (generally ¼ mile runs) and/or faster intervals as they get in shape. And Bill was smart – he would research the technical details he needed.

Coaching

Coaching makes a difference and as Concord Monitor Sports Editor Ruel Colby wrote in 1963 when comparing Bill Luti to other New Hampshire schoolboy coaches, "He has no peer". He wasn't a great coach because he was a great runner, he was a great coach because he was a great motivator, a stickler for details, a natural leader and a smart man who researched and studied various training methods. He was way ahead of most other New Hampshire coaches at the time in implementing a variety of training techniques. Discussions with other teams' runners at the time (early sixties) determined that some coaches simply had their team run the course for practice. Not Bill Luti. He employed multiple schemes to keep his runners fresh and progressing to a peak at the end of the season. His teams did speed work, interval work and distance work. He had hill training (both up and down) and half mile intra-team relays around the course. He introduced "fartlek" training, a Swedish term for 'speed training' that blended continuous running with fast spurts (alternating fast and slow paces). His runners loved the sound of the name if not the intensity of the workouts. As a change of pace, he might have a "Fox and Hounds" workout, a modified game of tag. The only rules were to remain within the confines of White Park and to always keep moving. Luti also studied the methods of other successful coaches and runners. He might try a technique that Bill Bowerman was using at Oregon or discuss the intense interval training of Emil Zatopek.

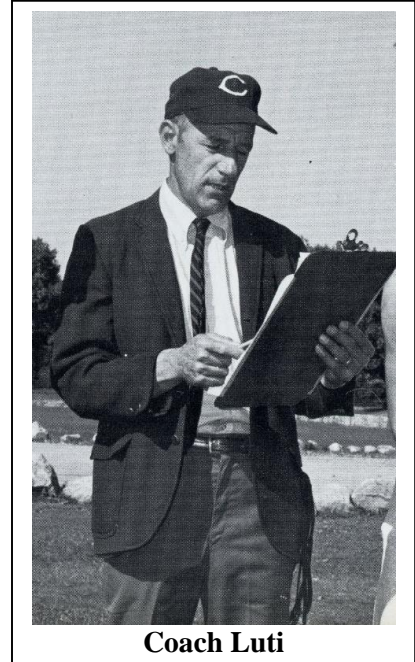
Coach Luti left no stone unturned as he prepared his teams for an important and closely competitive race. Before going into a state meet, for example, each runner on the team would know exactly how many runners from a particular opposing team could be in front of them for the team to win. And Luti assigned non-running team members to track the progress of various opponents and let the Concord runners know of their status at various points along the course.

Coach Luti was a man of faith. Before each race the team gathered around the coach and he recited the following prayer:

Heavenly Father
Be our guide
Watch over us
Protect us
Give us strength
Victory number ____!

And everyone would shout out the number of the victory for the season at the end. Did it help? Physically, probably no. There was no reason to believe that God would favor Concord over the boys from Keene or elsewhere. The miles run and the intervals endured were likely more important for the team's successes. But psychologically it helped a great deal. It provided the runners with a sense of support and comfort. Many runners repeated the prayer individually before track events where Coach Luti wasn't present. Of course now such a prayer would not be allowed.

For many runners Coach Luti was the most important adult male role model in their lives other than their fathers. And, during the formative high school years, he was more important than their fathers because, as we all know, teenagers never listen to their parents. But you did listen to Coach Luti and the last thing in the world you wanted to do was to do something to disappoint him. He had that natural leadership quality to inspire people to follow him and do what he asked. As can be seen from the record there were many times when Luti's teams were far superior to the opponents. But there was never any over-confidence on the team because each runner knew exactly how he should run and what the coach

expected.

To paraphrase a saying, a wise man knows what he knows, knows what he doesn't know and knows how to find out about the things he doesn't know. Bill Luti was a wise man. He came to Concord knowing little about cross-country. He didn't know how to score a meet or that the low score won but he went to the library and learned how to score. He researched and studied various coaching techniques. And he wasn't afraid to try something new. A prime example occurred in 1963 when he wanted Roger Maxfield to maintain a more even pace during a race. Maxfield was clearly the best runner on the team and his "reckless abandon" style of a very fast start was sufficient to win in New Hampshire. But Coach Luti was thinking ahead to the New England race and felt that Roger needed a more even pace to win at the New Englands. Coach required Maxfield to remain behind the third or fourth Concord runner for the first mile of several races to learn a more even pace. It worked as Maxfield went on to win the New England race. Harvey Smith was another wise man. When he began coaching cross-country at Simonds High in Warner, he knew that Bill Luti was the running guru and he went to Bill to find out about training techniques and schedules. He later coached Bill Luti's son Bill at Bishop Brady and led Brady to seven straight Class I titles. Harvey's success using Bill's formulas was further testament to Luti's preeminence in the coaching community in New Hampshire. We should also note here that Harvey also had the leadership and motivational skills as attested to by his later success as tennis coach at Concord High.

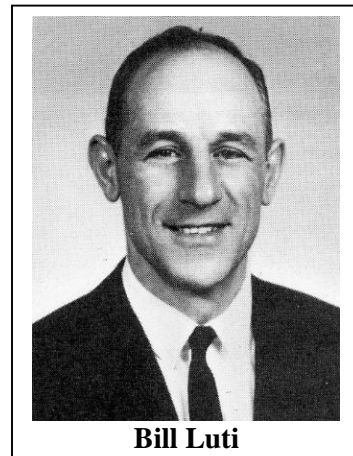

Another reason for Coach Luti's success was numbers - he "got out the numbers". As any good cross-country coach will tell you, the secret of success is numbers. Get enough runners to join the team and it's likely that a gem will be found. Coach Luti understood this and worked diligently to increase participation on the team. Bill began his first year with 16 runners. By his third year, when he won a state championship, he had nearly doubled the number of runners on his team to 31. His 1963 team that swept the top 5 places in the state meet had 59 runners and 50 runners or more was the norm for his teams for most of the sixties. It wasn't until the late sixties that the number of runners began to decline. A number of reasons contributed to this decline, including the anti-establishment feelings among the youth during the Vietnam War protest era and the introduction of soccer as a fall sport at Concord High in 1972. He had a number of ways to identify and recruit runners. Early in his career he held an annual "Rooster Ramble" to identify potential runners. Each year toward the end of October he would hold a 1.1 mile race at White Park, open to all students except members of the football or cross-country teams. The runners were divided into teams based on their class to add some competitive interest. The race proved popular. An example of the extent of participation is 1962 when 32 boys signed up, 25 ran and the sophomores beat the juniors and seniors 31 to 41 to 56.

Another technique Bill used was to observe the students in his physical education classes and assess their performance in various tests and exercises. He had the ability to identify potential runners and the charm to convince them to run cross-country. George Estabrook is a prime example. George grew up not playing organized sports, didn't consider himself to be an athlete and certainly had no expectation of participating in a sport at the high school level. At the end of his first (sophomore) year of high school, Coach Luti told him that PE class results indicated that he would be a good candidate to run cross-country and suggested he should try running for the team in the fall. George agreed to give it a try and ended up winning the first race he ever ran and was Concord's number one runner throughout his junior year and half way through his senior year until he developed shin splints.

It's important to not only get people out for cross-country but to keep them out. Given the fact that an official team consists of seven runners and only the top seven run in the larger meets, it was important to maintain the interest of the other 40 or so runners on the team. Coach Luti did this in a variety of ways. He set up JV races and races with some of the area's smaller schools, and ran everyone not in the top 15 or 20. He maintained the 12, 13, 14 and 15 minute clubs where all runners could strive to make the next lowest timed club and allowed runners to compare their times to previously graduated runners. He would acknowledge in newspaper write-ups improvements of certain runners in the middle of the pack. He would bring all runners on the team to the state meet and assign jobs to the non-running members. Some would be 'valets' for the runners, handling their sweat suits during the race. Others would be assigned places along the course to cheer or to yell out positions of competitors. Everyone felt a part of the team and shared in the victories.

Historically Concord had always had a tough course. In describing Concord's course used for the state meet in the 1930s, Ruel Colby wrote "a course that is as real a test of cross-country caliber as any in the state" (1930) and "one of the hardest in the state" (1931). At that time the course started in White Park and finished at Memorial Field (see historical information on the state meet, p. 11). Coach Luti maintained the tradition of having the toughest course in the state. He knew that after training and running on Concord's hilly course, Concord runners would find other courses in the state to be less arduous. Runners from other schools competing in Concord were often psyched out when first seeing Forest Street hill. The state meet was generally held at UNH during Luti's tenure where the only hill was the slight rise at the Field House. It was a 'piece of cake' for Concord runners. Concord had two courses during Luti's tenure. The first started and finished on North Fruit Street behind the high school. It went north on Fruit Street to School, right on School to Westbourne Road, left on Westbourne to Centre, down Centre to the entrance into White Park at the corner of White and Washington Streets, left into the park, over the bridge and up the dirt path and up over the ridge, across High Street (now Liberty) to Valley Street, down Valley to left on Forest, up Forest to right on Auburn, up Auburn to right onto Franklin, down Franklin to right onto Charles and into White Park. In the park it went along the path to the right of the ball field, left of the basketball courts, right of the pool and into the Glen, up onto Centre Street to Westbourne, across Westbourne to the pucker brush (path through the woods) to North Fruit and left onto Fruit to the finish line. In 1963 he introduced a new course to avoid a lot of the street crossings (see p. 35). It started and finished in White Park. It was better for the spectators by providing views of the runners during much of the race (on the old course spectators only saw the start and finish). It maintained much of the hills of the old course. It was the same course as described above from the 'bridge' to the 'glen' and finished going up the hill by the administration building to a right onto High (Liberty), a right onto Franklin, a right onto Charles and into the park to finish on the ball diamond. But Coach was smart enough to introduce the new course gradually and use both courses the first year so that seniors could still try to make the 12 or 13 minute clubs of the old course. In 1976 courses were increased in length from 2.5 miles to 5 kilometers (3.1 mi) and an extra loop within the park was added.

Coach Luti was always looking for ways to challenge his teams. Beginning in 1963 and continued annually for many years, he entered his teams into a 2-mile National Postal competition. Teams throughout the country would run 2 miles on a ¼ mile track and send in the five best times. The results would be reported and teams could compare themselves to teams from other states. It also allowed the teams to run against soon-to-be-famous runners, such as Jim Ryun in 1963 and '64.

Coach Luti did a lot of the little things, many behind the scenes, that helped ensure the long-term success of his program. At the beginning of the 1962 season he sent a letter to the parents of all the runners, touting the benefits of running and thanking them for allowing their sons to run for the team. The letter also contained a schedule of the season's meets as well as a map of the course. The author has a copy of said letter. He (the author) also has a letter from Coach Luti, sent to his parents at the end of

the 1963 season, saying how proud he was of their son's achievements, both as a runner and as a gentleman. The author can only assume that he wrote similar letters to the parents of other runners throughout the years, expressing his gratitude for the achievements of their sons. Such letters engendered a feeling of warmth and loyalty to the coach and to the sport of cross-country. They also provided justification to the parents for their decision to allow their sons to run cross-country rather than

work after school to earn money.

During the author's sophomore season Coach Luti brought the team to Bear Brook State Park for practice (the week before school opened). The team ran on trails through the woods during the morning, had a picnic lunch at noon and spent the afternoon swimming. This not only made running fun but was a great way to allow for team bonding. Coach Luti likely used many other tactics and techniques through the years to ensure the long-term success of his

program, tactics of which the author is unaware and for which there is no record.

Beginning in 1971, and for each year afterward, Coach Luti put together a booklet of the scoring sheets for every race that year and distributed them to all the team members at the end of the season (see p. 34 for an example of a booklet cover illustration). This was a fine souvenir of the season and was likely treasured by most of the runners.

Coach Luti also maintained a strong bond with his alumni runners. In the early years he always had a time trial race before the first meet of the season, splitting his team into two opposing teams. Beginning in the fall of 1974 he replaced the intra- squad time trial with a race against former Concord High runners – a race he termed a “rerunion”. The alumni enjoyed the race because they felt they were helping the current team prepare for the upcoming season, and the high school runners liked it because it gave them an opponent, other than

their teammates, to compete against prior to the start of the races that counted. Luti maintained this practice for the rest of his career and there was never any shortage of alumni to run. Now, “Luti alumni” get to compete in a separate category as part of the annual Bill Luti 5 Mile race as well as socialize among themselves and with the Coach at this race.

Scoring

A cross-country team consists of seven runners. The first five runners provide the scoring for the team. Their finishing place in the race is the number of points they score provided that everyone in front of them is a top 7 runner. A runner that places 5th in a race provides 5 points for the team. The low team score wins the meet. The 6th and 7th runner do not provide scoring points but they displace other runners from obtaining their place. If a team’s 6th runner places 9th in a race, he prevents an opposing team runner from achieving the 9th place. Runners not in the top 7 for their team play absolutely no role in the scoring. Their places are ignored when tallying team scores.

Below is a simple example for calculating team scores in a dual meet. It shows how runners outside the top 7 are ignored and how the 6th and 7th runners displace runners from the other team. It also shows that in a dual meet, a team that sweeps the top three places automatically wins the race provided they have a 4th and 5th runner that finishes the race. This is not true for multi-team races.

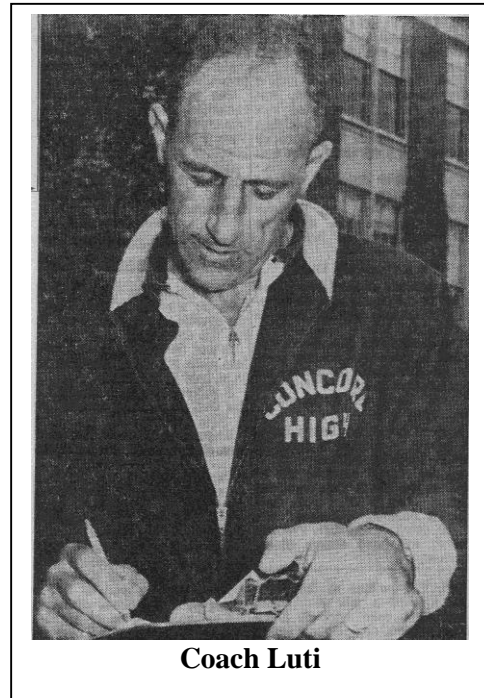
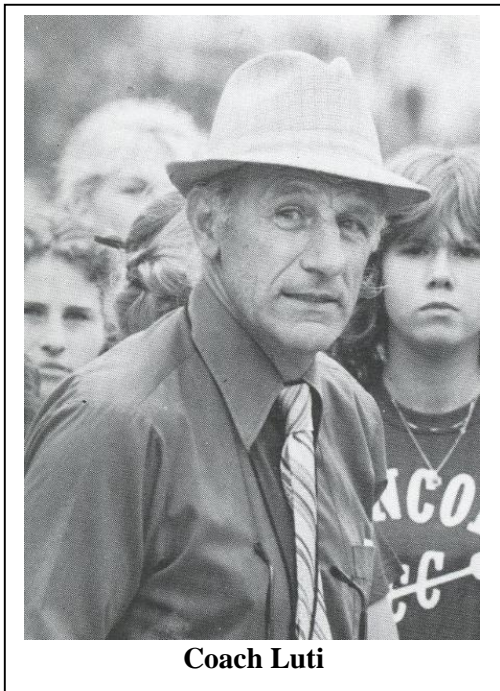

Concord gets places 1, 2 and 3. Keene gets places 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8. Keene’s 6th and 7th runners take

places 9 and 10. Concord then gets places 11 and 12 despite the fact that Concord's 4th and 5th runners placed 19th and 20th. The places of the Keene runners after their top 7 runners are ignored.

A perfect score is 15 - taking the first 5 places in a race. A 15 to 50 score means the winning team took at least the top 7 places. A 15 to 40 score is when the winning team takes the first 5 places and the losing team takes the next 5 places.

Teams are limited to 7 runners in large meets, unlike dual meets where everyone on the team can run. This means that every runner in the race either scores or displaces other runners. Ironically, sweeping the top 3 places in a large meet, which is much more difficult than in a dual meet, does not ensure victory. A fifth runner that places 150th provides 150 points for his team. Having a poor 5th runner is more damaging to a team in a large meet than in a dual meet. Good team grouping rather than one or two elite runners is often more important in the large meets.

Although somewhat unusual, it is possible to have a tie score after scoring the first 5 places for each team. This can happen in both dual meets and large meets and both occurred during Luti's career. The 1958 race against

Bishop Bradley was scored as a tied race and is the reason that Coach Luti's career won-loss record contains one tie. It occurred as follows.

This shows the importance of Concord's 6th man who placed 10th. He didn't figure into the team's score but he prevented Bradley from obtaining the 10th spot and the win.

Concord had more than one tie in a large meet but only one for first place. That occurred in 1981 in Luti's last year of coaching, when Concord tied Laconia for first in the Meet of Champions race. But by this time, the NHIAA had adopted a rule that stated that the lower 6th place finisher would be the tie breaker when the score was tied after the top 5 had been scored. Concord's 6th man beat Laconia's 6th man and Concord was declared the winner of the race. If this rule had been in effect in 1958, Concord would have beaten Bradley in the above illustration since Concord's sixth man beat Bradley's sixth man. Concord tied for third in the 1968 New England race and the result was kept a tie, but a tie for second in the 1979 New England meet resulted in a second place finish for Concord because of the 6th place runner

tie breaker.

Won-loss Record

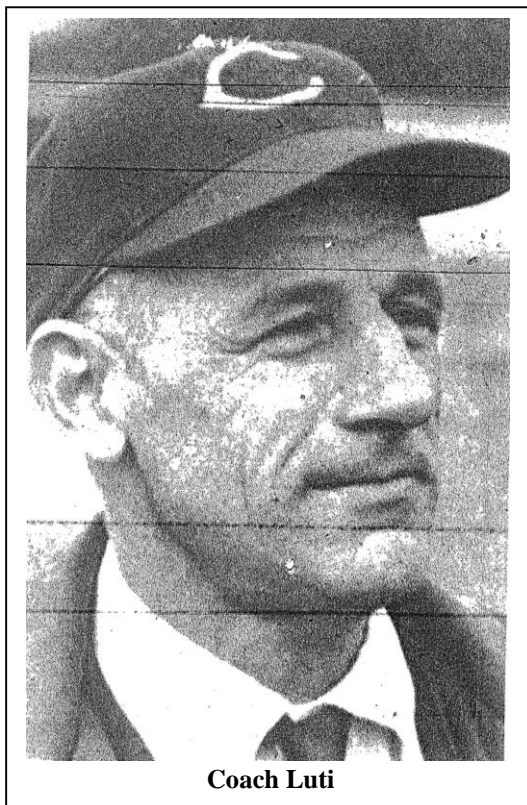
Calculating a won-loss record seems like it should be a straight forward exercise to the uninitiated, but it's not. Often multiple teams run in races. Do you count every team when tallying wins and losses? If you win a quad meet is your record 3 and 0? What about a race against 8 other teams and you place third: are you now 6 and 2? Ridiculous seasonal records can be created if every team in every race is included, including state and New England races. But is there a 'reasonable' field size to include in won-loss calculations?

What did Mr. Luti think? It turns out that he could care less about wins and losses; he was only interested in victories. In his own words: *"Won-lost records were no concern for me. The objective was always to win. In a dual meet (which most of them were in the early years) you either won or lost. In the occasional tri or quad meet, we either won or were 2nd, third or fourth. The more schools involved (invitationals, state, etc) the less sense it made counting teams that finished ahead of you as losses, and teams you finished ahead of as victories. You either won or were 2nd, 5th, 12th or whatever. Somewhere along the way some coaches in multiple team meets – invitationals, state, etc – started scoring v. each team involved, resulting in ridiculous season records like – won 52, lost 12. The NHIAA was not involved in keeping won-lost data.*

During his coaching career Coach Luti only kept track of victories. However, a career won-loss record often accompanies articles about Luti's achievements and the question remains, how was it calculated. Coach Luti's regular season won-loss record includes all wins and losses against all teams raced against during the regular season except for invitational races. The placement of the team in the invitational races is recorded, similar to the post-season state and New England races, but these races do not contribute to the won-loss record. This makes complete sense. Not including the regular season invitational races makes sense because invitational races tend to be similar to the post-season state and New England races in terms of the number of teams participating. This was the convention used to determine what I refer to as the "official" record as maintained by Coach Luti and listed in the 1980 CHS Yearbook dedication to Coach Luti as well as in subsequent articles. The convention does not consider the number of teams in the invitational races.

Despite the above 'official' approach, I believe a reasonable argument could be made for including all 4 team race results in the won-loss tally, whether they are invitational races or not. This would create 27 additional wins for Luti's career. Coach Luti hosted two four-team (including Concord) invitational races during his career: the tri-state or Capital City Invitational from 1970 through 1974 and the Capital Area Invitational from 1977 to 1981.

The former race included one top team each from Maine, Vermont and Massachusetts (a total of 4 teams including Concord); the latter was a race of the four area schools Brady, Merrimack Valley and Pembroke Academy along with Concord. These two small invitational races create an interesting situation. Most years Concord raced against the three Manchester schools Central, West and Memorial in a quad meet. Based on the 'official' convention, a victory against these three teams resulted in 3 wins but a victory



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against three top teams in the tri-state race did not. If a 4 team limit is used as the criterion to determine if a race's results should be included in the won-loss record, both invitational races discussed above would be included.

A comparison of the results from the two methodologies (without and with the 4 team invitational races) is provided in the Table below. The official results (doesn't include invitational races) are listed first, the results including 4 team invitational races are listed second. The results are identical through 1969. Beginning in 1970, results varied because of the existence of the two invitational races.

Including the two 4-team invitational races results in the loss of one undefeated season (1970), an additional two losses (one each in 1970 and '71) and 27 additional wins. The results are 265 wins, 28 losses one tie and 12 undefeated seasons as compared to the "official" record of 238 wins, 26 losses one tie and 13 undefeated seasons.

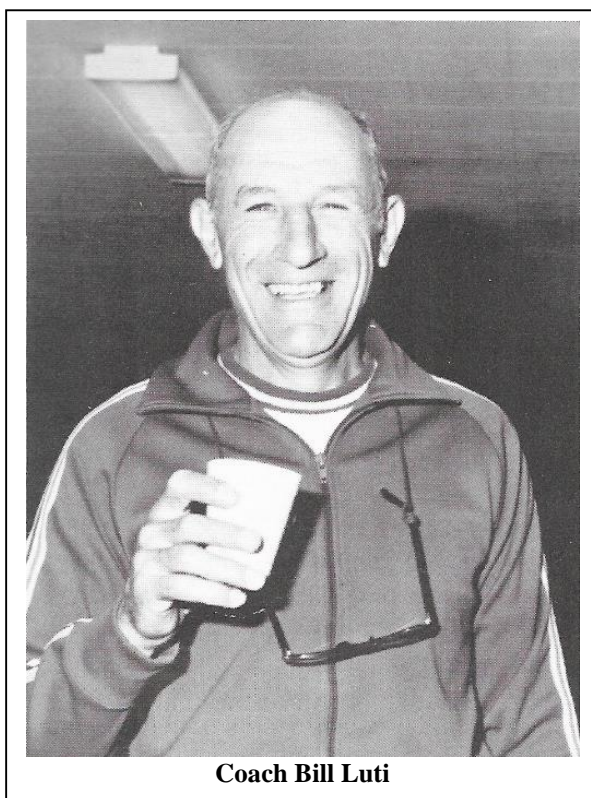
As discussed above, Coach Luti's response to this possibility of bolstering his won-loss record was "won-lost records were no concern for me", so we will stay with the 'official' convention. In the yearly summary sheets in Appendix A, the individual team scores are provided for these 4-team invitational races but the results are not included in the won-loss record.

State Meets

Based on historical state meet documents found among Coach Luti's papers, the first state championship meet was held in 1930. It was billed as a state championship but was actually a dual meet between Concord and Manchester Central. Both teams had finished the regular season undefeated and were meeting to determine the state champion. The race was held on the Concord course, considered one of the toughest in the state. The race started on the ball diamond at White Park, circled the park and then headed down High (now Liberty) St. into the sand pit (now Grappone Park), up over the ridge to the Reservoir (on Penacook St.) to Columbus Ave. to Auburn St. – Ridge Road – Fruit St. to Memorial Field, finishing on the track during a football game. Concord won the race 21 to 34. Central's Harold Ferrin beat out Concord's Dave Webster for first place. The Concord Monitor had front page coverage of the race including a description of lead changes throughout the race (we discuss the changing – diminishing – media coverage of cross-country races in the "Teams" Section on p. 21).

In 1931 a "Kiwanis Meet to determine the state champion" was held and billed as the first state meet of its kind. Five teams ran: Concord, Central, West, Nashua and Lebanon. Concord was again victorious, beating Central by the same 21 to 34 score as the previous year but this time Concord's Webster beat Central's Ferrin for first place. Annual state meet championships were held each year (except for two years during WWII) from this time forward. The table on the next two pages lists the winning teams and runner-ups, along with the individual champs from 1930 through Coach Luti's coaching tenure ending in 1981 (the Luti years are shaded).

You will note that Central and Concord dominated the meet from its inception through World War II. Central, in particular, dominated first place, winning 8 championships over a 10 year span (1932 – 1941). It is important to recognize that at this time very few teams competed. Central achieved a perfect score of 15 (had the first 5 finishers) in both 1932 and 1933. Four teams (Central, Concord, Nashua & West) competed in 1932 and only three teams (Central, Concord & West) in 1933. The only other time a perfect score was achieved in the state meet (at least for the large class schools) was the 1963 Concord High team which competed against ten other teams. The increasing scores of the winning teams through the years reflect the increasing competition. Concord's last 3 championship teams during the Luti era (1979-81) averaged 77 points (Table 4 or Table B-1) against an average of 15 teams (Table B-17). Growth in the southeastern portion of the state is reflected in the runner-up teams (Exeter, Pinkerton & Guertin) during these same 3 years. It is unlikely that any team will ever again achieve a perfect score in the state meet.



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Concord and West tied for first in 1945. The state did not adopt the rule of using the place of the sixth man as a tie breaker until much later.

Concord's dominance in the 1960s is clearly shown in the table. Concord won 8 championships in 9 years from 1962 through 1970 and the average team score for these 8 years was 31.

Coach Luti had 13 state Class L championship teams during his 25 year career as coach of the Concord High boys cross-country team. Three of the championships occurred during the Meet of Champions era and all three included an MOC championship.

Teams participating in the state Class L meet during the Luti era and their places are listed in Table B-17. Note that only three schools, Concord, Portsmouth and Keene, had official teams participating in all 25 of the Luti years. Concord's average state meet finish for the 25 years was 2nd, better than any other school. The next best was Keene with 4 and Pinkerton with 4.2 (Pinkerton's first year of participation was 1969). The increase in southeast NH schools around 1970 can be seen. Luti's worst state meet finish was a fifth place, which occurred twice, in 1972 and 1977. During the previous 25 year period (1930-1956 with 2 missing years for WWII) Concord had 9 state team championships (one was a tie for first), and this was a time when fewer teams participated. Concord did not win another state championship (Class L – they did win the MOC in 1982) after Luti retired. Concord had three

individual state champions during the previous 25 years: Dave Webster in 1931, Richard Mead in 1936 and Bob Datson in 1945. Coach Luti had 5 individual state champions winning 6 state meets: Roger Maxfield in 1962 & 1963, Gerry Love in 1964, Steve Smith in 1965, Tom Atherton in 1970 and Russ Cutting in 1973.

The table below lists Concord's first runner in the Class L state championship races during Coach Luti's tenure. Every year but one (1972) he had a runner in the top 10.

The individual results of Concord's teams in the state meet during the Luti era are listed in Table B-1 in Appendix B.

Concord did not win a New England team championship prior to Coach Luti's tenure. In fact, only two New Hampshire teams won the championship between 1935 and Luti's coaching debut in 1957: Manchester Central in 1935 and Keene in 1953. Concord had one individual champion during this time – Richard Mead in 1936. It appears from historical material in Luti's papers that only four states (MA, RI, NH & ME) ran in the New England race in 1935. Connecticut first ran in 1937 and Vermont joined in 1946.

Concord won four New England championships during Coach Luti's 25 years of coaching, in 1962, '63, '64 & '70. He also had two individual champions: Roger Maxfield in 1963 and Tom Atherton in 1970.

It is difficult to compare team and individual results in the New England races through the years for two reasons. First is the number of the six New England states participating in the race. During Luti's coaching career states participating in the race were as follows:

- 1957-1963 – 6 states, 18 teams (3 each)
- 1964-1972 – 5 states (no CT), 15 teams (3 each); CT did not send teams but did send top individual runners from 1965 to 1969
- 1973-1977 – 4 states (no CT or MA), 12 teams (3 each)
- 1978-1981 – 3 states (no CT, MA or ME), 12 teams (4 each)

The second issue is the scoring. Generally each state sends 3 teams and the top 10 or 15 individual runners. The places of the individual runners should be removed before calculating the team scores. Sometimes this was done and sometimes it wasn't.

The results for Concord runners in the New England races is listed in Table B-2 in Appendix B. For some years both the actual places and the corrected places used for scoring are available (the corrected places are in parentheses); for other years the actual places were used to calculate the team scores.

The Teams

Appendix A lists the top runners and the scores of each race by year, along with a short but detailed narrative summarizing the year. Appendices B and C provide a variety of tables referenced in the report. An overview of the teams is presented here.

The Fifties

Bill Luti began his Concord High School boys cross-country coaching career in 1957. He inherited a team from long-time coach Delly Callahan that had four wins, 2 losses and a fourth place finish in the state meet the previous year. Coach Callahan had won four straight state meets from 1948 through 1951, led primarily by runners Donald Gagnon, Paul Saltmarsh, Richard Saltmarsh, Peter Hood and Robert Call. However, for the past five years (1952 - 1956) the team had averaged a fifth place finish in the state meet at a time when only 7 or 8 teams ran in the Class A race. The 1957 team had about 16 runners, four returning lettermen and were led by co-captain Clark Billings, followed by Ralph Messer and Dick Dickson. They compiled a three win, three loss season with a third place finish in the state meet.

Clark Billings graduated and the 1958 team was led by co-captain Ralph Messer. He won four of the five dual meets and placed second to Keene's Pete Fletcher in the dual meet with Keene and in the state meet. It was Pete Fletcher's third straight state meet title. Messer was supported primarily by Pete Mamos, Dick Dickson and Bob Prentiss. They had a record of 2 wins, 2 losses and a tie, and again placed third in the state meet. Despite a second consecutive .500 season, improvement was evident.

The two losses were each by one point and Mamos and Dickson were injured and didn't run in the tied race.

In his third year of coaching Bill Luti's team went from a .500 team and a third place state meet finish to an undefeated season and a state championship. The 1959 team had a record of 7 wins, 0 losses and was led by co-captain Dick Dickson. Dickson won five of the six regular season races, was second to Central's Phil Jutras in the regular season race and was second to Art Scott of Portsmouth in the state meet. Bob Prentiss and Carl Cuddemi were generally the second and third runner for Concord and they placed third and fourth in the state meet behind Scott and Dickson. Concord was the first New Hampshire team in the New Englands, placing sixth. One contributing factor to Concord's success was Coach Luti's ability to get more runners out for the team. The number of runners increased from 16 to 22 to 31 in his first three years of coaching.

The Sixties

The fifties ended with an undefeated season and a state championship. The sixties would end up being a very successful decade but the first year of the decade did not look promising. Seven of the top ten runners graduated from the undefeated 1959 team and only two, co-captains Bob Prentiss and Jeff Spoor, ran for the 1960 team. But Luti's expanding team numbers (32 runners in 1960) increased the possibility of discovering hidden gems - and two gems were found on the 1960 team. The two runners were George Estabrook and Dave MacEachran. Estabrook was a junior who had not run previously. He ended up winning the first race he ever ran and was the number one runner for Concord throughout the year. MacEachran was a sophomore, new to running, and developed into the second or third runner for the team. Concord ended the season with six wins, 3 losses and a second place finish in the state meet, a better than expected result.

The 1961 team saw an increase to 41 runners by season's end, the emergence of two super sophomores in Parker Morgan and Roger Maxfield and the beginning of five straight undefeated seasons. Co-captain George Estabrook was again the number one runner at the beginning of the season but developed shin splints in mid-October and never returned to top form. Concord was the best team in the state but only narrowly better than Keene (a three point dual meet victory). With Estabrook's injury and a couple of less than stellar performances, Concord finished a disappointing second to Keene by 8 points in the state meet. Morgan was Concord's top runner in the race finishing third. Concord redeemed themselves the following week with a runner-up finish to Norwich Free Academy of Connecticut in the New England race, 62 points ahead of Keene in 7th place.

The 1962 team had nearly 50 runners and saw the emergence of juniors Bob Estabrook, Alex Saltmarsh and Rick Bell to complement fellow juniors Maxfield and Morgan. Maxfield took over the number one runner spot from Morgan after the second race with Morgan second and Estabrook third for Concord in every race. The team was undefeated and began a string of four straight state championships, four straight individual state champions and three straight New England championships. The team easily won the state meet with 27 points to second place Keene's 105. Maxfield, Morgan and Estabrook placed 1-2-3 in the state meet, followed by Saltmarsh (9) and Bell (12). Concord won the New Englands but only by eight points, and the coach and team were disappointed with the results. With the top five runners returning the team was determined to improve on their New England effort the following year.

The 1963 team, now with nearly 60 runners, became arguably the most dominant cross-country team in Concord's history - and in the state (Concord's top teams during the Luti era are discussed later, beginning on p. 25). Led by Roger Maxfield, who won every race and set records on every course but the New Englands, Concord raced through an undefeated season and again won the state and New England championships. Maxfield, Morgan and Estabrook repeated their 1-2-3 finish in the state meet but this year were followed by Saltmarsh and Gerry Love in fourth and fifth place respectively. Tom Forest of Concord finished 7th and two of the team's top 6 runners, Rick Bell and Doug Nydegger, were injured during the season and did not run in the state meet. This demonstrates the depth of talent on the 1963 team with the possibility of sweeping the top 7 places if the injuries hadn't occurred. This was the first (and last) perfect score in the state meet (sweep of the top 5 places) since Central had accomplished

the feat in 1932 and 1933 at a time when only 3 or 4 teams ran in the state meet. A perfect score has not been achieved since. The 1963 team won the New Englands in dominating fashion, scoring 48 points to 119 points for runner-up New Bedford, MA. Maxfield was the individual race winner. Just as the 1963 team was arguably the best Concord team, Maxfield was arguably the best individual runner for Concord (Concord's top runners during the Luti era are compared later, beginning on p. 29). Although his record times were eventually broken, it wasn't until 1970 that Concord's Dan Tromblay and Lee Hafemann broke Maxfield's White Park course record. He was the only Concord runner to win the state meet twice and was one of only two Concord runners to win the New Englands - and the other winner, Tom Atherton, wasn't even the best runner on his team until the state and New England races. As indicated, we will discuss in more detail the best Luti teams and runners later in the report (p. 24).

Given that the top five runners at the beginning of the 1963 championship season were seniors, one would expect that 1964 might be a down year. But not Coach Luti's team. The 1964 team completed Concord's fourth consecutive undefeated season and third consecutive state and New England championships. The team was led by Gerry Love. He was the state meet winner, beating Memorial's Ken Klatka in a close finish. Teammates Doug Nydegger and Steve Smith placed third and fourth. The team was nearly as dominant as the '63 team, winning the state and New England races by an average of 50 points.

Concord completed its fifth straight undefeated season in 1965. It was led by co-captain Steve Smith who was beaten by only one NH runner during the season. He won the state meet, the fourth consecutive year that a Concord runner placed first in the state meet. Concord also garnered the 5th and 9th spots in the state meet with George Curtis and James Leary. Concord was the first NH team in the New Englands, placing fifth. Massachusetts was very strong this year, sweeping the first three team positions.

The 1966 team, with three of their top seven runners out with injuries, lost to Winnacunnet by five points in the third race of the season. This was big news in Concord. It was front page, top of the fold headline news in the Concord Monitor. It was the first time the Concord cross-country team had been beaten in a regular season race since the last meet in 1960. The winning streak was 42 races against 59 teams over a six year period. They lost to Keene the following week, again by five points. Concord's season's record was 11 wins and 2 losses. The team, led by Jon Kendall, Dick Hicks and Walt Chadwick placed third in the state meet and was the second NH school in the New Englands, placing sixth. Not a bad record for most teams.

But Luti-led Concord teams were not like most teams and, in 1967, they rebounded to begin another string of undefeated seasons through the end of the decade. The 1967 team was led by Jon Kendall and Walt Chadwick. They breezed through an undefeated season beating most teams by wide margins and with three perfect scores. They won the state meet easily with 33 points to 61 for runner-up Keene. Chadwick placed second, Kendall was fourth and all five runners were in the top 10. Concord was second to Brockton, MA in the New Englands.

The 1968 team, led by Walt Chadwick and Alan Paige, was almost a carbon copy of the '67 team. They were undefeated, beating all teams but Keene by wide margins and with three perfect scores. They again won the state meet and Walt Chadwick again placed second. They were third in the New Englands behind winning team Brockton, MA. Bishop Brady had developed a strong cross-country team under the tutelage of Harvey Smith, who had sought advice on training methods from the master himself - Coach Luti. Brady had won the Class I state championship in 1967, the first of seven straight, and a Concord-Brady dual meet was established in 1968. Concord won the first race handily with Chadwick and Paige taking the first two spots. But Brady's Neil Ackley would come back to be NH's first runner in the New Englands in the 1968 race.

The outlook for the last year of the sixties decade was similar to that of the first year of the decade. Seven of the top 10 runners from the 1968 team graduated, there were fewer runners on the team (38) than in past years and there was no dominant runner. However, Coach Luti was able to coach them into a team with good grouping (small time gap between the first and fifth runner). The team managed another undefeated season with several perfect scores and won the state meet easily over Keene, 34 to 76

points. Concord placed their top five runners in the top 10 in the state meet. The team was generally led by Lee Hafemann and George Stohrer who placed 4th and 5th respectively in the state meet. Concord was fifth in the New Englands as the first NH team.

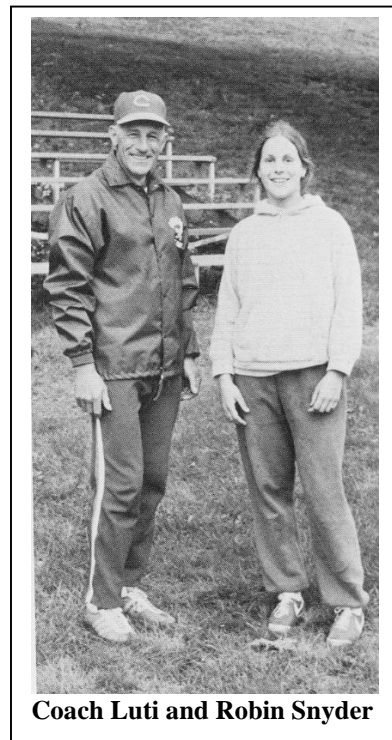
The sixties decade ended with eight undefeated seasons, seven state championships, four straight individual state champions and three straight New England Championships. The 1960 and 1966 teams were the only teams of the decade with a regular season loss and 1966 was the only year that Coach Luti did not have a runner in the top 5 in the state meet - and it was a 6th place finish.

50's & 60's versus 70's & 80's Running

In a number of ways, running in the fifties and sixties was different from running in the seventies and eighties. Several interrelated changes in the running experience and running community occurred in the 2 to 3 year span on either side of 1970. First of all Concord did not have a leash law during the earlier period. During this time a runner quickly learned how to deal with an aggressive barking, snarling or charging dog. One hasn't lived until encountering a Great Dane galloping down the road toward him looking like a small horse. Later runners didn't need to worry about dealing with potentially biting dogs.

It was also rare to see someone running along the side of the road in the early years. "Normal" people didn't run. If a runner was viewed, he (and I do mean "he" - women definitely didn't run) was likely a high school or college cross-country runner. If you were a kid on a bike and saw some high school runners, you rode up alongside them and shouted such witticisms as "hut, two, three, four," "where's the fire?", "what's your hurry?" and "who's chasing you?". I know - I did it and had it done to me. It wasn't until the early seventies that the running "boom" took place, perhaps inspired by Frank Shorter's marathon victory in the 1972 Olympics and Bill Rodgers successes in the Boston Marathon. Suddenly doctors, lawyers and housewives were running. It was the "in" thing to do. Aerobic exercises in the gym had been a popular activity as people became concerned about their health and now they were realizing that aerobics could be accomplished in the fresh air by running. The popularity of running among the public sometimes overshadowed the accomplishments of the high school cross-country team in the media. An example is the Concord Savings Bank Race. This popular 10 K race initiated in 1978 was held at Beaver Meadow on the day following the high school New England meet. Bill Luti's last three state championships occurred in 1979 through 1981 and the teams went on to run in the New England race. Monday's Monitor - there was no Sunday edition at the time - often had a longer and more prominent story about Sunday's local 10K race than Saturday's New England race results.

Another milestone that occurred during this period was the passage of Title IX in 1972. This law stated that no person, based on sex, should be excluded from any part of education. Its major impact was in the field of sports, providing women with an equal opportunity as men to participate in school sports, once fully implemented. Prior to this women at Concord High had few opportunities to participate in sports other than intramurals. For example, the 1964 yearbook listed no girls' interscholastic sports, one girls club sport (skiing) and nine intramural sports. Intramurals included such sports as archery and badminton as well the more traditional sports of basketball and softball. Concord High girls began running unofficially in 1973, led by Robin Snyder (pictured with coach Luti above), who is considered the pioneer for women's running at Concord High. It wasn't until

1975, however, that the first official girls varsity cross-country team and sanctioned state meet was held. On the national stage, 1972 was the first year that women were allowed to officially run in the Boston Marathon - five years after Katherine Switzer first ran in the race and was attacked by race director Jock Semple.

Soccer first became a varsity sport at Concord High in 1972. Prior to this date, football, cross-country and golf were the only fall sports available to boys - and of course none were available to girls. Many good athletes who later might play soccer became cross-country runners. It is somewhat ironic that as running became more popular in the general population, participation in cross-country tended to decline at the high school as more boys played soccer or had other interests. This was at the height of the unpopular war in Vietnam, with public protests on college campuses and elsewhere and an anti-government and anti-establishment feeling among many youth.

Coverage of cross-country race results by the Concord Monitor also changed during this period. First of all the Monitor was a city paper during the fifties and sixties, not a capital area paper. Write-ups of sporting events at schools around the Concord area rarely appeared in the paper. Ruel Colby was the Sports Editor and in the fall he focused on Concord and St. Johns football, Dartmouth and UNH football and Concord cross-country (St. John's did not have cross-country). With no women, only two schools (Concord High and St. Johns/Brady) and one major sport (football), cross-country received major coverage. Each cross-country race received at least minor headlines, a write-up about the race and a listing of every runner with his time and place. And of course the last person listed in the race results would be a G. Washington, A. Lincoln or Jim Shoes so that no Concord runner had the ignominy of coming in last. After the mid-seventies Concord cross-country results were often relegated to the Round-Up section along with other area schools and girl races, and only the top runners were listed.

The competition also changed over the period, as would be expected as state population growth patterns changed. In the early years mill towns such as Laconia, Dover and Stevens of Claremont were Class L schools. Portsmouth prior to the closing of Pease Air Base was a sports power. The explosive growth in southeast New Hampshire had not yet occurred. Salem, Londonderry and Bishop Guertin did not exist as high schools and Pinkerton was a small school.

The competition was improved in the seventies and eighties due at least in part to the population growth in the south. Bill Luti's 25 year coaching career can be neatly divided in two by the year 1970: 13 teams in the fifties and sixties and 12 teams in the seventies and eighties. Concord was more dominant during the earlier period with eight state and three New England championships during that time compared to five state and one New England title after (and including) 1970. A ranking of Luti's teams based on the number of points scored in the state meet (see App. B, Table B-3) shows that 11 of the top 13 teams were 1950's or 1960's teams. Only the 1970 (tied 2nd) and 1973 (tied 6th) teams from the later period broke into the top 13. Table B-4 shows that the runner-up teams behind Concord's last three state championships (1979-1981) were southeast New Hampshire teams, showing the increased competition from this growing area of the state.

The Seventies

Concord ended the sixties decade with an undefeated season and a state championship, the third straight year for each. Could they continue their victorious ways in the seventies? They began the 1970 season with two outstanding runners in Dan Tromblay and Lee Hafemann. Coach Luti was concerned however with the significant time gap between these two runners and the 3, 4 and 5 runners. In the Keene race both Tromblay and Hafemann broke Roger Maxfield's White Park course record set in 1963. During the season the above time gap steadily declined, particularly by Tom Atherton. Concord lost to Wachusett Regional, MA in the inaugural race of the Capital City Invitational - a four team race. By the end of the season the 1970 team had developed into one of the best teams of the Bill Luti era (Table B-3). They were undefeated by New Hampshire teams and won both the state and New England championships. The Table on the next page (a subset of the above referenced Table B-3) lists the top five Luti teams based on the state Class L race scores. As the table shows, the 1970 team tied the 1964 team for second place in the state meet scores but ran against more teams in the state meet and had a

better New England team score. Later (p. 25) we discuss methods to rate the top teams by data other than or in addition to the state meet score.

Tom Atherton, in the first race he ever won, won the 1970 state meet by 0.1 seconds over Richard Osbourne of Winnacunnet. Hafemann, Tromblay and Channing Snyder followed in positions 3, 4 and 5 respectively. The following week Concord easily won the New England race and Tom Atherton, in the second victory of his career, was the individual winner - after seven of the top runners were disqualified for cutting the course.

The 1971 team began the season with 47 runners but the top eight from the previous year had graduated. It had a good grouping of runners but no outstanding ones. The team lost to a very strong Brady team, the first loss to a New Hampshire team since 1966. They also lost to Burlington, VT in the invitational race. The team, led primarily by Steve Foote, won the rest of their races, placed third in the state meet but did not qualify for the New Englands. Brady, the Class I state champ, had the best aggregate time of all the classes in the state meet and was the first NH team in the New Englands.

The 1972 year was a down year for Concord. It was also the first year of varsity soccer at Concord High. Graduation, injuries and two top runners from the previous year moving out of town contributed to the down year. Their best runner was Mark Warren who was Concord's first runner in all the races in which he competed. But he belonged to a church that forbade him to train or compete on Saturdays and thus was unable to run in the state meet. Concord lost to three NH schools including Brady, the most losses since 1960. They placed fifth in the state meet and did not qualify for the New Englands. Their top finisher in the state meet, Dan Welch, placed 13th, the first (and only) time in Coach Luti's career that he did not have a runner in the top 10 in the state meet (see Table B-5 or previous Table 6). The previous worse place was 6th. It is a testament to the strength and consistency of Luti's teams that a record of 9 wins and 3 losses was considered a down year. The seven state meet runners were all underclassmen, providing a favorably prognosis of a return to the top next season.

Concord did return to the top in 1973 and they did so in dramatic fashion. They were undefeated, won all but two of their races by perfect scores and won the state meet easily over Keene, 36 to 84. They were led by juniors Russ Cutting and Brian Ackley who placed one-two respectively in the state meet. Concord followed its state meet victory with a runner-up finish in the New Englands to powerhouse Pilgrim High, RI, who won their third straight New England title. Cutting placed 6th in the N.E. race.

The 1974 team returned the top two runners from the previous year's state meet and Steve Aldrich provided a good third runner, but a significant time gap existed to the 4th and 5th runners. Russ Cutting had issues with severe bronchitis and, although he ran well during the season, he never reached the dominant form he had as a junior in winning the state meet. He was Concord's 2nd runner to Brian Ackley when Ackley was healthy. Brian Ackley was the number one Concord runner for the first six races of the season and was only the third CHS runner to break the 13 minute barrier on the White Park course, along with Dan Tromblay and Lee Hafemann in 1970. However, he was out sick with shingles

for 3 weeks and was second to Russ Cutting in the final meet of the regular season and in the state meet. Concord performed admirably, considering the health issues of their top two runners, but lost to two teams during the regular season, placed third in the state meet and did not qualify for the New Englands. Although the girls did not have an official team, Luti arranged for some races for the women, led by Robin Snyder. He and athletic director Bill Haubrich organized a 1.5 mile women's race as part of the Capital City Invitational. The race had 123 girls from 17 schools and Snyder placed fifth. Robin Snyder is considered the pioneer for women's running at Concord High. She ran for Coach Luti on the girl's track team but graduated the year before women's cross-country became an official varsity sport in the fall of 1975.

The 1975 team began the season with 24 runners, the smallest squad since 1958. They were led by co-captains Jay Smith and Steve Aldrich. The team lost the first meet of the season to defending state champ Laconia but won the rest of their meets, squeaking by Brady by one point. They placed second in the state meet to Laconia, led by Peter Gamble's 10th place finish, but did not qualify for the New Englands. The girls had their first official varsity season, finishing with a 4 - 2 record and a 7th place finish in the state meet. The team was coached by Christine Robinson and led by Kathy Kirsch, Sue Wechsler and Sarah Tillotson.

Two innovations occurred for the 1976 season: course lengths were increased from 2.5 miles to 5 kilometers or 3.1 miles, and a Meet of Champions (MOC) was established. The MOC consisted of the top finishing teams and individuals in each of the state class races and determined the teams and individuals to go to the New England race. The 1976 team was led by Jay Sweeney and Peter Gamble. They lost to two teams during the regular season (a record of 11 and 2), placed fourth in the state class L meet led by Gamble and Sweeney's fifth and seventh place finishes respectively and placed fourth in the MOC. The team did not qualify for the New Englands but Sweeney and Gamble qualified as top10 finishers in the MOC. They finished 10th and 12th respectively in the New England race.

The 1977 team was perhaps the worst performing team of the Bill Luti era (Table B-3). They accumulated the most points (136) of any Concord team in the state meet, placed 5th in the state meet to tie the 1972 team for the worst state meet finish and did not qualify for the MOC or the New Englands. Despite this dubious distinction however, they had a record of 9 and 3, easily won the first annual Capital Area Invitational (against Brady, Merrimack Valley and Pembroke) and top Concord runner, sophomore Peter Finney, placed 10th in the state meet. Not a bad record for most teams. This was also a time of strong New Hampshire teams as NH teams swept the top three team places in the New England race and Mark Kimball of Timberlane was the individual NE winner.

The 1978 team began the season with about 20 runners, less than half the size of Luti teams during the hey-day of the sixties (and BS: before soccer). The team had good quality runners however, and was expected to be a contender for the state title. Peter Finney and Moe Fairley led the team although Finney was bothered by shin splints during the season and was often below par. Concord lost to two teams, Keene and Nashua, during the regular season and lost to the same two teams in the state meet. In the state meet, however, they were within 4 points of the winning team and one point of the second place team after losing to them both handily during the season. The team placed 4th in the MOC and did not qualify for the New Englands.

In the last year of the seventies decade Concord returned to the top. Five of the top seven runners from the previous year returned and the team was again led by Peter Finney, Moe Fairley and Dave Lyons, with Finney number one for Concord in every race. Concord was undefeated for the season. They won the state meet with Finney placing second and won the MOC with Finney fifth. This was the first year that the state meet was held at Derryfield Park in Manchester (except for 1965). The previous races had always been held at UNH until last year when it was held at a golf course in Ashland. In a New England race in which only three states competed (NH, VT & RI), Concord placed second with Finney placing 7th. In her first cross-country season as a junior, Barbara Higgins was the number one runner for Concord's girls team. She was the third NH runner in the New Englands, placing fourth, after 9th and 10th place finishes in the state Class L and MOC meets respectively.

The Eighties

The seventies ended on a high note with an undefeated season and a state championship. Bill Luti would coach the boys cross-country team for only two more years and those two years would continue the high note with state championships in both years.

Concord lost the top two runners from the previous year but began the 1980 season with a small (23 runners) but good quality team. Dave Lyons and Bryan Nowell were the number one and two runners for Concord. The 1980 team completed a second consecutive undefeated season and won both the state Class L and MOC titles. Lyons placed 3rd and 5th in the two races respectively. Concord was the first NH team to finish in the New Englands but only placed 6th despite only three states participating. Lyons placed 10th in the race. The girls' team placed 3rd in the New England race with Barbara Higgins placing second.

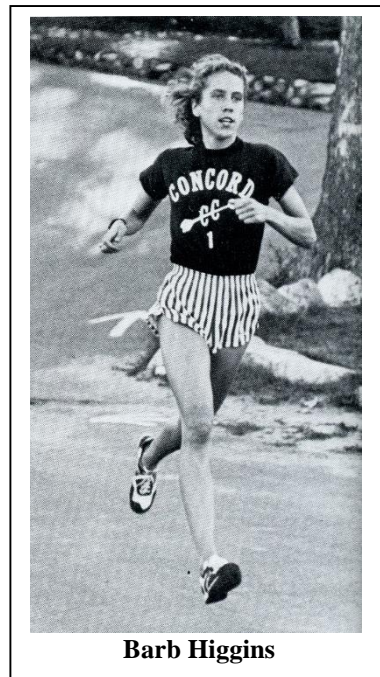
Only two of the top seven runners from the 1980 team were back for the 1981 season. Jon Rummler and Scott Johnson shared the number one runner spot. Concord lost two meets during the season to Bishop Guertin and Winnacunnet and was beaten by these two teams plus Pinkerton in the Manchester Invitational race.

Going into the state meet a third or fourth place finish was about the best that could be expected. But once again Mr. Luti worked his magic and Concord easily won the state title, beating second and third place Guertin and Winnacunnet by 28 and 43 points respectively. Comparing times from the other classes, a third or fourth place finish was again the expectation for the MOC. But again Concord came through and won the championship. Concord tied Laconia for first place after the top 5 runners' scores were tabulated. The tie breaker was the place of the sixth runner and Concord's Mike Eliasberg beat Laconia's 6th man, giving Concord the win. Concord was unable to continue its overachievement in the New England race, placing 7th as the third NH team. Londonderry was the first NH team, placing third.

The 1981 team was the last boys' cross country team coached by Bill Luti. He retired following the 1981-82 school year although he later returned for a two year stint as the girls' cross country coach. He left behind a good core of runners as only two of his top seven runners were seniors. New coach Bruce McMahon would inherit the team in 1982 and lead them to Class L runner-up and MOC championship finishes.

Best Team - Best Individual Analyses

Clearly Bill Luti had a very successful career as boys cross-country coach at Concord High. His won/loss and multiple championship records speak for themselves. He coached many outstanding teams and individuals. Comparing teams and individuals to determine the best serves no real purpose except that it is fun to do. It is also impossible to do. It's like comparing Bob Cousy to Michael Jordan or Jack Dempsey to Muhammed Ali – different eras with different facilities and training. It is not appropriate to compare times among the years. Times have always improved through history as equipment, training facilities, training methods etc have changed. The fact that 100 meter dash Olympians today are running faster times than Jesse Owens does not mean they are better sprinters. He was the best of his time. An example of improving equipment is running shoes: Roger Maxfield ran in high top canvas basketball sneakers his first year of running (1961). Comparison of results against contemporary teams and

individuals is the most appropriate comparison. We need to recall that ‘results’ comparisons only measure results; it does not measure potential. There are many other factors, many of them subjective, that can affect the performance of teams and individuals, including illnesses and injuries and the strength of the competition. So with the above as a caveat, let’s look at the numbers.

Team comparisons

The goal every season is to improve throughout the regular season to reach a peak for the post season races. When comparing teams (and individuals) it is appropriate to compare post season results when the runners are at their best. Because of inconsistencies in scoring protocols and variable state participation in the New England races, the State Meet is the best venue for comparisons.

Recall the discussion of the 1963 team where the team was deemed the best because it swept the top five places in the state meet. The 1970 discussion referenced Table B-3 (Appendix B) where all 25 of Luti's teams were ranked based on their state meet scores. A subset of that table is presented below, sorted by state meet points.

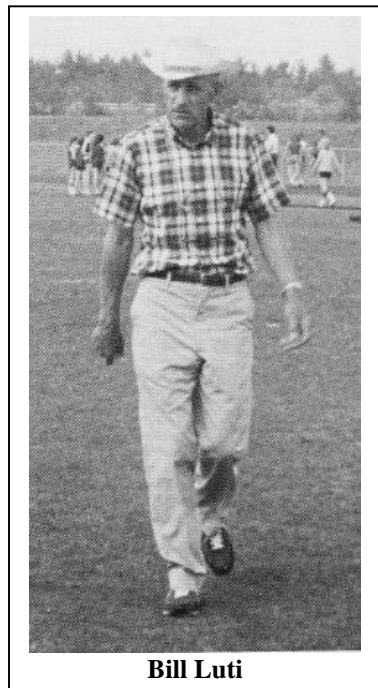

The top four teams based on state meet scores were 1963, 1970, 1964 and 1962. The 1970 and

1964 teams tied for second in score but second was given to 1970 because of more opposing state meet teams and a better New England score (see Table B-3 for this additional information). State meet scores is just one way to compare teams. Appendix B provides several tables looking at other criteria. Another way to look at the results is the dominance of the state meet victories. A ranking of the 13 state championship teams based on point margin of victory and percent margin of victory over the second place team are portrayed in Tables B-6 and B-7 respectively. The 1962 team is first based on the point margin of victory and 1980 moves into third place. But 1980 drops away to ninth using the percent margin of victory and 1963 is once again on top.

Table B-8 lists the New England results for all New Hampshire schools for the 13 years that Concord won the state championship. This portrays the strength of the NH schools and helps address the reason for Concord's dominance in some of the state meets. For example, was the top 5 sweep of the 1963 team in the state meet possible because Concord was so strong or because the rest of the NH field that year was so weak. The first NH Class L school in the 1963 New Englands after Concord was Memorial in 12th place (5th place Stevens was Class I), 225 points behind Concord, suggesting a rather weak NH Class L field. How does this compare to other years? Using the data from Table B-8 we create two additional tables, comparing and sorting the difference in point totals between Concord and the next NH school in the New Englands for the 13 years that Concord won the state meet. Table B-9 rates the difference between Concord's score and the next NH Class L school and Table B-10 rates the difference between Concord and the next NH school, regardless of Class. Table B-9 shows that the above 225 difference for the 1963 team was only the third largest. The 1970 and 1964 teams had a greater difference. The comparison with the next NH school (Table B-10) indicates that the 1973 team had the largest point differential; 1970 was second and 1963 dropped all the way to fifth. What does this mean? It's somewhat of a chicken and egg issue: is it Concord's strength or other NH teams' weaknesses that account for the difference in point totals. A smaller difference in points may be more reflective of a less strong Concord team than a strong NH field. The development of these three tables (B-8, B-9, B-10) was an interesting exercise but didn't provide any definitive conclusions. We also need to recall our earlier discussion of the difficulties in comparing New England race scores because of the changing number of states participating and the scoring of individual (non-team) runners. At all odds, we do know that Concord won the New Englands in 1963 by the widest margin (71 points) of the four New England championship teams (Table B-11), reinforcing the selection of the 1963 team as the dominant Luti-coached Concord team.



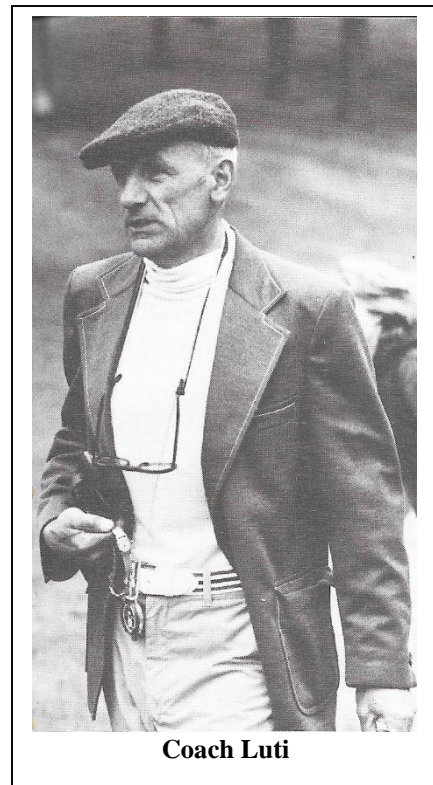

We have been comparing teams based on the number of points scored in the state meet. This seems to be an appropriate procedure but is it possible to compare the strength of teams over an entire season? We use two different but related approaches to do this. The first analysis was to take the top 8 Concord teams based on state meet results (from Table B-3), list the top 5 runners in the state meet for these teams (from Table B-1) and then list all the NH runners from other teams that beat them during the regular season. The total number of runners that beat Concord's top 5 during the season is then tabulated. If a runner from another team beat all 5 Concord's runners, 5 points are contributed to the total. This measures the strength of the team throughout the season. The analysis was completed using all regular season meets that were part of the season's won-lost record (i.e., no invitational races; recall earlier won-loss discussion) and using NH runners only. Out-of-state runners were not included, even if a meet was part of the won-loss record, because we want to compare the strength of the team against NH teams. The total points or runners for each of the years was sorted to determine the strongest team. The raw

data is presented in Table B-13 and the sorted data in Table B-14. If a runner missed a regular season

race, his result for that race was estimated based on the relative performance of his teammates. The estimate is listed separately in the total for that runner in the raw data. In this analysis the 1973 team comes out on top, followed closely by the 1964 team. The 1963 team that was first based on state meet scores (Table B-3) is a somewhat distant third.

A drawback to the above analysis is that it favors teams with a consistent top 5 group of runners. It penalizes teams having a number 5 runner in the state meet that was perhaps an 8 or 9 runner early in the season but came on strong at the end of the season. To avoid this issue we look at team scores during the regular season. In other words, it doesn't matter who the top 5 runners are, it's whoever scored for the particular race. Again we look at all regular season races (no invitationals) but, unlike in the first analysis, we do include races against out-of-state schools that were part of the won-loss record (e.g., dual meet with Brattleboro, VT). This analysis was applied to the top 10 teams from Table B-3. The raw data is presented in Table B-15. The raw data results were separated into dual, tri and quad races (2, 3 & 4 team races respectively). However, since each year had a similar number of tri and quad races (and for ease of analysis), the results were combined for the sorted data (Table B-16). Once again the 1973 team came out on top. It had the lowest average score, the most number of perfect scores and the greatest percentage of perfect scores. The 1963 and 1964 teams were ranked 2nd and 3rd. Interestingly the 1969 team tied for 2nd for the number of perfect scores but was only tied for 6th for the lowest average score (and had the most number of runners beating their top 5 runners (Table B-14)).

We now have three tables ranking the top Concord teams, tables B-3, B-14 and B-16. With the understanding that B-3 is based on state meet results and B-14 and B-16 both measure season-long strength, let's total the rankings in the three tables. The top 6 teams are ranked in Table 10 (below), based on the ranking in the three tables. The table shows a slight edge for the 1963 team with the 1964 and 1973 teams tied for a close second. The 1973 team was first in 2 of the 3 rankings.

Although we said at the beginning of this section that we would compare results and not times, participation in the 2-Mile Postal race gives us an opportunity to compare times under relatively uniform conditions. The races were all held on a quarter mile track. Table B-12 ranks the total time of the five top runners in the 2-mile postal races and the top times of the top individuals. This table is provided for informational purposes only. The results are not considered useful for comparing teams or individuals because, in addition to the issues of improving training, facilities and equipment affecting times, the

results for 10 years are missing and the ability to run on a flat, even track may not be the same as running on hilly, uneven terrain. The table lists 1970 and 1964 as the two top performing teams.

The author was a member of the 1963 team and has a more intimate knowledge of that team over many of the other teams. Understanding that this is a bias, he now makes an argument, in addition to the discussion above, for the selection of the 1963 team as the best Luti team of all time. First of all, the team swept the top 5 places in the state meet. No other team accomplished this feat. Secondly, the team won the New Englands with

the lowest score and by the largest margin of the 4 New England championship teams (Table B-11). But, the reader may ask, what about its ranking as only the 3rd best team based on the number of runners from other teams beating the team's top 5 runners (Tables B-13 and B-14)? Let's look at the facts. Concord's number 5 runner in the state meet, Gerry Love, had an amazing career but was generally Concord's number 7 runner for the first half of the 1963 season. Injuries to Rick Bell and Doug Nydegger, along with a strong improvement in Love's running during the season, resulted in Love being the number 5 runner

for the last half of the season. If Bell and Nydegger had run in the state meet, Tom Forest, who placed 7th in the state meet, would not have made the team and Gerry Love, who placed 5th, would likely have been the team's number 7 runner. Sweeping the top 7 places would have been a real possibility. Rick Bell was equal in ability to Estabrook and Saltmarsh and, if he had been healthy, likely would have been beaten by only 3 runners during the season, giving the team 9 points rather than the 15 and tying the 1964 team for second, two points behind the 1973 team (Table B-14). Another example of the strength of the 1963 team is the strength of runners not making the top 7. Any reader that is a member of the New England running community knows the name Bob Teschek. He is the founder, owner and CEO of Granite State Racing Services. He has provided road race timing, management and computer services for over 200 races throughout New England since the early 1980's. What you may not know is that he ran for Bill Luti and he ran on the 1963 team his senior year. His experience provides further support for 1963 as a strong team. He was a top 10 runner for the team but not a top 7 runner so did not run in the state or New England races. Of the 11 teams he ran against during the regular season of 1963, he would have been the # 1 runner on three of the teams, the # 2 runner on five teams and the # 3 runner on two teams. Only on the Keene team would he have been as high as the # 5 runner. He would have run in the state meet for every team.

In the interest of fair play we should point out that other teams had injury and sickness issues and other teams had similar situations as Bob Teschek's above. We should also note that Class I (Intermediate) was established in 1963. Four teams that ran in Class L in 1962 were in Class I in 1963 (see Table B-17). One of these teams was Stevens High of Claremont and Gary Roberts' (of Stevens)

time was one second faster than that of Concord's number five runner (Gerry Love). No one knows what the outcome would have been if they had been in the same race, but the possibility exists that Concord would not have had its perfect score. We should also point out that the 1964 team had an amazing top 4 runners (Table B-13).

Individual comparisons

Now let's look at the numbers comparing Luti's best runners, keeping in mind the previous caveat that many factors can affect the numbers, and performance, not times, is the most appropriate comparison. The most obvious approach is to look at runners that were state and/or New England champions. The Table below lists these runners.

Five Concord runners won the state meet during Luti's career. Only one, Roger Maxfield, won it twice, although Russ Cutting had the potential to win it a second time but contracted bronchitis his senior year. Concord had two New England champions: Maxfield and Tom Atherton. A further analysis of Maxfield's and Atherton's championship years reveal that Maxfield won every race and set course records on every course he ran that year whereas Atherton's only victories that year were in the state and New England races. Taking nothing away from Atherton's amazing accomplishment, Maxfield ranks as the best runner by this analysis.

For informational purposes, Concord's top runner in each state meet during the Luti era is presented in Table B-5 in Appendix B and in Table 6 in the text. Also for informational purposes the times of the state meet winners are listed in Table 12 below, despite the fact that times are not considered a valid means of comparison through the years.

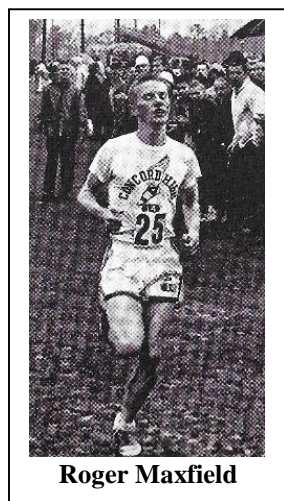
Since we are talking about times here, it is interesting to note that Roger Maxfield had the fastest time of all of Luti's runners in the 2-Mile postal race (Table B-12) despite being the earliest participant.

If the goal is to select the best runner, the above analysis of state champions seems to be the most straight forward approach. However there are a number of other ways to look at the data that ranks multiple runners and allows for comparisons among these runners. The first is to list all runners that ran in the state meet all three varsity years and rank their average finish (freshmen were at the Junior High and were not allowed to run with the varsity for most of Luti's career). This analysis allows good runners who weren't number one on their team to be evaluated and requires some consistency in excellence. A total of 20 runners met this criterion (see Table C-1) and the top 10 are listed below. 'State Meet' is the Class L race for all years since the Meet of Champions was only run during Luti's last six years. 'Senior Yr' is the senior cross-country year, the fall before graduation the following spring.

Interestingly, under this analysis Maxfield is second to his teammate Parker Morgan. While Maxfield ended up being the number one runner, Morgan's entire career average in the state meet was a little better. It is also interesting to note that only two of the five eventual state meet winners are even listed: Maxfield and Cutting. This highlights a drawback to the above analysis: many runners that were good later in their careers were not good their sophomore years.

Let's look at the results if we take the average state meet finish for the junior and senior years only. A total of 51 runners are ranked according to their average state meet (again Class L) finish (see Table C-2). The top 10 are listed on the next page along with their New England results (the top 25 with New England results are in Table C-3). The notation "dnr" denotes "did not run".

Once again Roger Maxfield is rated the top runner. His teammate Parker Morgan is rated second best (he tied Walt Chadwick for second but his better finishes in the New Englands gave him the nod for second). Where possible, New England results were used to break other ties. Only Atherton of the state meet winners is not listed in the top 10 of Table 14 – he was seventeenth (Table C-3).

This analysis also has drawbacks. It requires two good years. Very good runners who had one off year because of injury or sickness are penalized. An example of this is the year 1974. As explained by Coach Luti: *“In 1973 Russ Cutting and Brian Ackley finished one-two in the State as JUNIORS. I fully expected them to repeat in 1974, or at least be right up there. Both contracted serious illnesses in the middle of their senior season, Russ with severe bronchitis, and Brian with shingles. Their doctors cleared them to return to running just before the State. They opted to run. As a result their 6th and 7th place finishes were remarkable but their times didn’t even qualify them for the New Englands as individuals. I agonized for them, but of course could not have felt prouder.”* Other examples of injuries exist. Based on his performance during the first half of the year before getting shin splints and the subsequent performance of his teammates, George Estabrook likely would have placed second in the state meet his senior year behind Pete Compos of Keene. His two year average would have been 4 rather than the 18. Peter Finney had shin splint issues his junior year. The analysis also rewards runners that performed better in the state meet than their regular season performance would have predicted.

The reader can make his own judgment but the author’s opinion is that the top five Luti runners were Roger Maxfield, Parker Morgan, Walt Chadwick, Russ Cutting and Brian Ackley (see next page), with Maxfield a clear-cut number one and no particular order for the other four. The inclusion of Cutting and Ackley in the top 5 reflects the influence of Luti’s explanation of their senior year illnesses over the raw numbers. The top 5 teams were 1962, 1963, 1964, 1970 and 1973. Although the 1963 team was previously designated the most dominant team (p. 18-19) and accomplished the unique feat of capturing the top 5 places in the state meet (and the author has a bias for this team from being a member of it), there is no clear cut number one team. Arguments can be made in support of the 1963, 1964 and 1973 teams as the number one team.

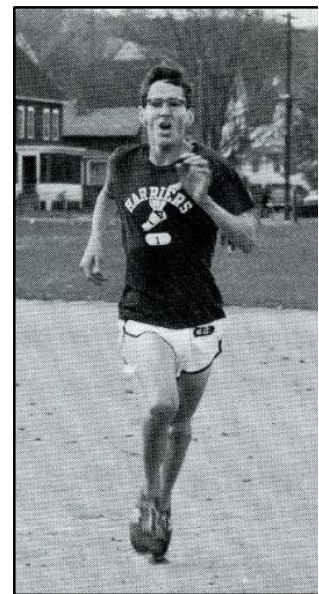
Top 5 Concord Runners during the Luti Era

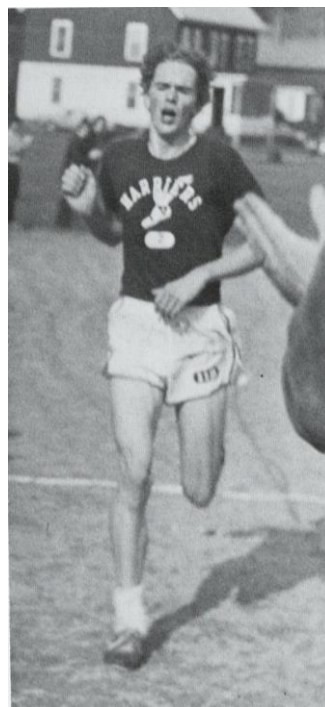

Coach Luti has often thought about rating his teams and individuals. In an email where he explains that *“numbers are not the whole story”*, that *“many other things can come into play in evaluating the performances, many of them subjective”* and that knowledge of these factors is *“knowledge that only a person who was intimately involved for that whole time period would have – namely the coach”*, he writes *“I can’t recall how many times I’ve tried to rate all those teams”*. I think that was a gentle hint that even he can’t select a single team or individual as the clear number one and the rest of us shouldn’t even try.

For informational purposes, all runners that were in the top 10 for their teams are listed in Appendix C, by year (Table C-4) and alphabetically (Table C-5). For some years 11 or 12 runners are listed in order to include all runners that frequently ran in the top 10.

Interesting Tidbits

Only two Concord runners were a top ten runner in each of their four year high school career. This statistic is not legitimate as a criterion for determining the best runners because, for most of Luti's coaching career, ninth grade was at the junior high school and freshmen could not participate on high school teams. The two runners were Moe Fairley (1976-79) and Bryan Nowell (1977-80) (see Table C-5). Both were good runners but neither became Concord's number one runner, although Fairley was number one for several races his junior year when Peter Finney had shin splint issues. Moe Fairley was the only Concord runner during the Luti era to run in the state meet all four years of high school (see Table B-1).

Another interesting fact is that one Concord runner, Phil Jagemann, ran on three consecutive New England Championship teams. No other Concord runner and no other runner in the state has accomplished this feat. Despite this accomplishment, he was never an elite runner. He was Concord's number 7 runner his sophomore and junior years and number 5 runner his senior year. He was a good runner at a time of outstanding teams.

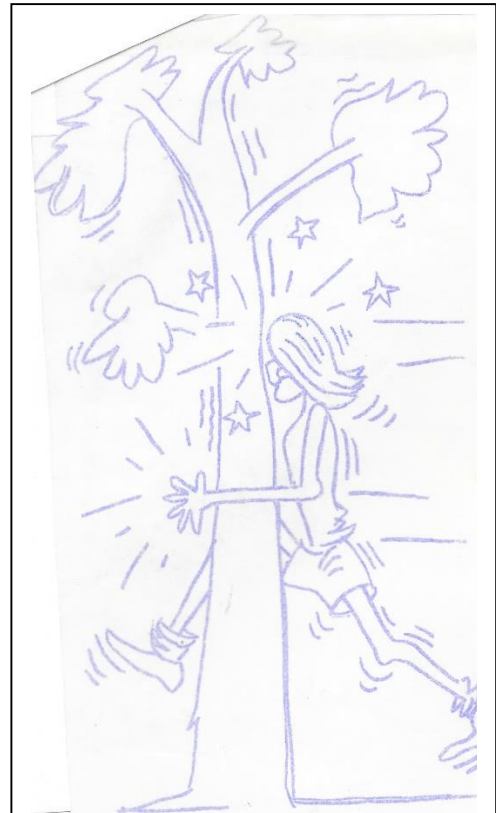
Two former Coach Luti runners, Bob Teschek and Barb Higgins, are responsible for keeping the annual Bill Luti 5-Miler road race going. This is a Concord race that Bill helped organize in 1968 and it was re-named in his honor in 1984. The author’s only claim to fame is that nowadays he is usually the oldest Luti alumni to run in the Luti 5-Milers.

Walt Chadwick may be one of the more successful post college Luti runners, having run a 2:24:46 at the 1983 Boston Marathon.

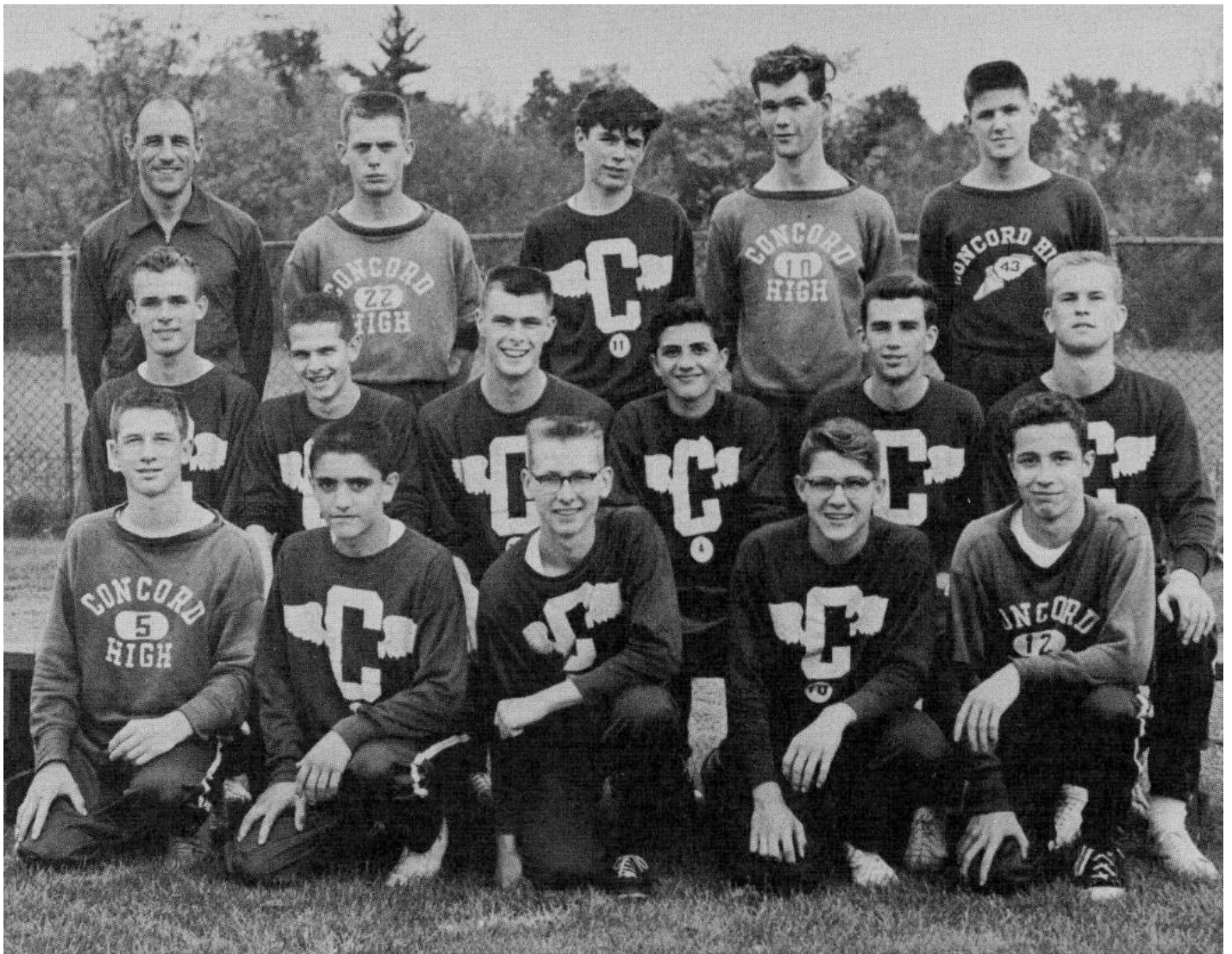

Comments:

This was Bill Luti's first year coaching the Concord High cross-country team. He inherited a team previously coached by long-time cross-country coach and legendary baseball coach Eugene (Delly) Callahan, who retired the previous year after 35 years with the Concord School District. Last year's team had 4 wins, two losses and placed 4th in the state meet. This year's team had four returning lettermen: co-captains Clark Billings and William Mahoney, Peter Mamos and John McGilvary, and a total of about 16 runners on the team.

Billings was Concord's top runner in every race but one that he jogged after being out sick with the flu for several days. Mahoney was second for Concord in the first race, third in the second, fourth in the third and then he left the team for an after-school job. Messer was third for Concord in the first race and second for Concord in each subsequent race except for the one he won when Billings was sick. Sophomore Dickson came on strong after the first couple of races to be Concord's third runner. Mamos and Boulter generally completed the top 5.

Coach Luti's first team had 3 wins, 3 losses and placed third in the state meet. Concord had two perfect scores of 15 (first 5 places) during the season. Bishop Bradley won the state meet (38 points) followed by Portsmouth (48), Concord (71) and Keene (77). Pete Fletcher of Keene was the individual winner. Nine teams were entered in the race, eight teams ran (Central scratched) and Dover had only four finishers and was disqualified, so only seven teams were official finishers. Concord showed good grouping in the state meet with an order of finish of Billings (6), Messer (11), Dickson (17), Mamos (18), Boulter (19), Beck (21) and Chandler (28). Concord beat Keene in the state meet after losing to them handily during the regular season. Concord was the first team to get all 7 runners home.

In 1957 the first team in each class and the top 10 times went to the New Englands. Clark Billings was Concord's lone qualifier for the New Englands and he placed 87th in the race. The New England race was won by J.Silveira of New Bedford, MA with Waterville, ME the winning team. The first NH finisher was Peter Fletcher of Keene in sixth place.

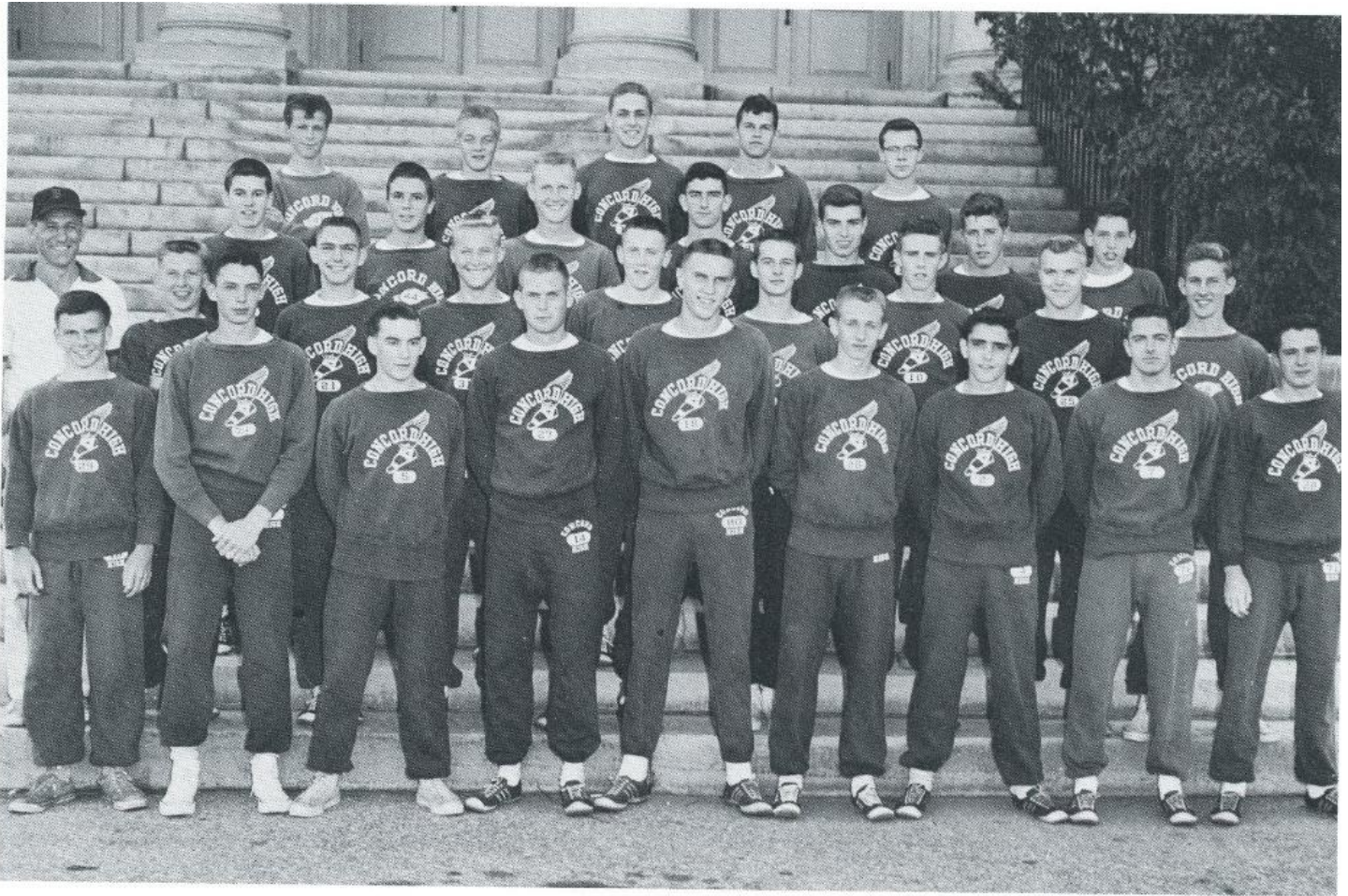
Concord began the season with 22 runners, including three returning letter winners. Pete Mamos and Dick Dickson began the season injured and did not report to the team as active runners until the last week in September and did not run until the Keene meet. Ralph Messer was the number one runner for Concord throughout the season, winning four of the five meets. He was second to Pete Fletcher of Keene in the dual meet and Fletcher and Messer were one-two in the state meet. This was Fletcher's third straight state meet victory. The 2 through 6 runners for Concord generally consisted of Mamos, Bob Prentiss, Dickson, Dave Morgan and Tom Andrews with their positions varying throughout the season.

Concord won two, lost two and tied one. However, the two losses were each by one point, Mamos and Dickson were absent for the Bishop Bradley (tied) race and Bob Prentiss was sick and didn't run in the St. Paul's race. With a little luck, Concord could have been undefeated. Morgan tied a Nashua runner for second place in the September 30th race, thus the half point in the final scores as each runner contributed 2 1/2 points toward their team score.

Concord (76) was third in the state meet behind Keene (42) and Portsmouth (69). Concord's finishing places were Messer (2), Mamos (13), Dickson (16), Carl Cuddemi (22), Prentiss (23), Jeff Spoor (29) and Bob Fortier (41). A change in the rules provided that the top three teams with the best times in the state meet went to the New Englands, regardless of class, but Concord was not one of the top 3 teams. Ralph Messer was Concord's lone qualifier for the New England race but it appears that he didn't run the race. J. Silveria of New Bedford, MA won the New England race for the second consecutive year and LaSalle Academy of Rhode Island was the team winner. Pete Fletcher of Keene was again New Hampshire's first finisher, placing third.

Some runners run year-round, participating in winter and spring track and some use cross-country as a means to get in shape for other sports. This year's team had at least three runners that played varsity basketball and baseball: Ralph Messer, Joe Fortier and Norm Higgins. Norm Higgins is the father of well-known Concord High track and cross-country star Barbara Higgins who ran track for Bill Luti in the early 1980s.

Comments:

In his third year as coach at Concord High, Coach Luti had his first undefeated regular season and first state championship. Concord had one perfect score of 15 (against Dover and West) and won all the races easily. The closest team score of 21 - 34 against St. Paul's was Coach Luti's first victory against the private school.

Concord began the season with 31 runners including 8 returning lettermen. Co-Captain Dick Dickson was the number one runner for Concord in every race. He won every regular season race except one where he placed second to Central's Phil Jutras. Bob Prentiss and Carl Cuddemi were the number 2 and 3 runners for Concord. The final two top 5 positions were generally filled by Tom Andrews, Charles Rancour or Jeff Spoor in varying order.

Concord (40) won the state Class L meet with Stevens (44) second and Portsmouth (85) third. Finishing places for Concord's runners were Dickson (2), Prentiss (3), Cuddemi (4), Andrews (15), Spoor (16), Rancour (27) and Hal Mahar (42). Dickson was second to Art Scott of Portsmouth, a team Concord did not face during the regular season. Manchester Central ran the race but Phil Jutras was not listed in the top 30 finishers (and likely did not run). Concord had the best aggregate time of all three classes and Dick Dickson had the fifth fastest time of all the classes.

With two weeks between the state and New England meet, Coach Luti arranged an unofficial race during this time to keep his runners sharp. Concord ran against a combined team from Winnacunnet and Exeter comprised of the best six runners from each school that had placed first and second in the State Class M meet. Class M champ Fred Hersey of Exeter won the race but Concord took the team title 26 to 29.

Concord (170) placed sixth (6 of 18 teams) in the New England race. They were the first NH team but Stevens (187) was close behind with a tie for seventh place. Lexington, MA (102) won the team title followed by Glastonbury, CT (138). The winning runner was Ed Meehan of Olive Ames High of N. Easton, MA. Concord's scorers were Dickson (12), Prentiss (13), Cuddemi (30), Andrews (53), and Spoor (62). These are the corrected places after the individual (non-team) runner places were removed. Rancour and Mahar completed Concord's team.

Concord graduated 7 of the top 10 runners with Prentiss, Spoor and Rancour returning.

Concord began the season with about 32 runners. They were defending state champs but had only two returning lettermen in the two co-captains Bob Prentiss and Jeff Spoor. Two pleasant surprises for Coach Luti were junior George Estabrook and sophomore Dave MacEachran. Estabrook did not run as a sophomore, won the very first race he ever ran (Nashua) and was Concord's number one runner throughout the season. MacEachran was generally Concord's second or third runner. Bob Prentiss, who was third in the state meet the previous year and was projected to be the number one runner, was generally number two when he ran but was often sick and didn't run or was not at full strength. Jeff Spoor was a top 5 runner. Ted Mulligan, another junior in his first year of running, was top 5 at the beginning of the season but was lost for the last half of the season with a small bone fracture in his lower leg. Gene Herbert and Don Haugen came on strong at the end of the season to be top 5 runners. Concord beat 6 teams and lost to 3 during the regular season. The Bishop Bradley Invitational consisted of 6 teams from New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Rhode Island along with some individual NH runners. It was won by LaSalle Academy of Providence, RI (39) with Bishop Bradley (50) second. Concord (84) was fourth. New Hampshire had the best individual runners as Scott (Portsmouth), Compos (Keene) and Estabrook (Concord) took the first three places (Scott and Compos competed as individuals).

Concord (101) was runner-up in the state meet behind Portsmouth (62). This result was better than expected as they had lost to Stevens and Bishop Bradley as well as Portsmouth previously. Keene (103) and Bishop Bradley (115) were third and fourth. Defending champ Art Scott of Portsmouth won the race followed by Phil Jutras of Central. Concord's runners were Estabrook (6), Prentiss (13), MacEachran (20), Spoor (30), Herbert (32), Fred Buttrick (34) and Haugen (60). Estabrook was Concord's lone qualifier for the New England race. He was the fifth New Hampshire runner, placing 33rd. The race was won by Art Scott followed by Phil Jutras, the 1st and 2nd runners from NH's state meet. New Bedford, MA (50) won the team score with Beverly, MA (97) second. Places for the three NH teams were Lisbon (6), Portsmouth (7) and Winnacunnet (12).

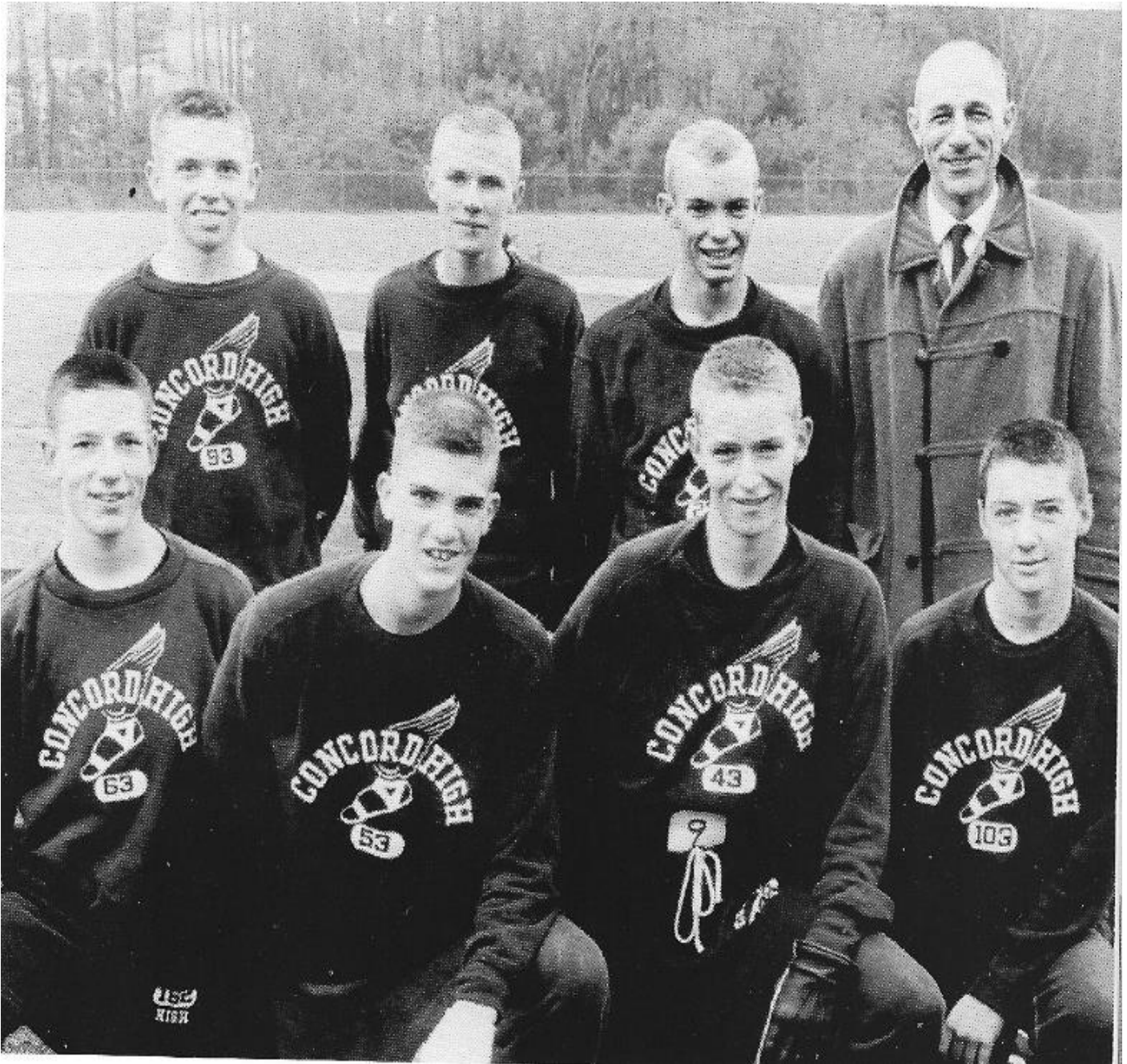
Concord was undefeated and the best team in the state during the regular season but Keene was a close second, falling to Concord in a dual meet by only 3 points. George Estabrook was the number one runner for the first half of the season, but developed shin splints in mid-October and was unable to train. He didn't run in 2 of the last 3 races and was never back to full strength. The 4 "M" runners Ted Mulligan, Parker Morgan, Roger Maxfield, and Dave MacEacheran comprised the next four places in varying order - and the top 4 places after Estabrook was injured. Morgan and Maxfield were sophomores new to the team.

Concord (97) placed second to LaSalle Academy, RI (84) in the Bishop Bradley Invitational. The race consisted of 17 teams from MA, RI & NH along with additional runners for a total of 199 racers. The race winner was Dave Campbell of Bishop Hendricken, Warwick, RI. Concord's scorers were Estabrook (15), Maxfield (16), Morgan (18), Mulligan (23) and MacEacheran (25).

Although Concord was undefeated by NH teams for the season, they did not have a strong outing at the state meet and was runner-up (73) to winning team Keene (65) by 8 points. Morgan placed third behind Pete Compos (Keene) and Gary Roberts (Stevens). Other Concord finishers were Mulligan (8), Maxfield (11), MacEachran (21), Estabrook (30), Roger Comee (34) and Alex Richter (63). Concord was disappointed with the results but had the second fastest overall team time of the 3 classes and qualified for the New Englands.

Coach Luti was unable to attend the New England race as his mother's funeral was on race day. Inspired to produce for Mr. Luti and exact their revenge on Keene, the team showed outstanding grouping, placing second (109 pts) to Norwich Free Academy, CT (86 pts). Third was LaSalle Academy (122 pts) who previously had beaten Concord in the Bradley Invitational. Keene placed 7th overall with 171 points, 62 points behind Concord. Ted Benedict of New Canaan, CT was the individual winner. Concord places were Morgan (38), Maxfield (44), Mulligan (45), MacEachran (50), Comee (52), Alex Richter (110) and Estabrook (113). The first NH finisher was Don Putnam of Antrim in 23rd place.

Comments:

The 1962 team was undefeated and was state and New England champs. The team began a streak of 4 straight state championships, 3 straight New England championships and continued a streak of undefeated seasons begun the previous year that would extend for 5 straight seasons.

Parker Morgan won the first two races of the season with Roger Maxfield second. Roger won the rest of the races (except New Englands) with Parker second. Bob Estabrook was the third Concord runner in each race and was third in every regular season race but two. He was beaten by Gary Roberts of Stevens and Ken Klatka of Memorial but beat both of them in the state meet. Alex Saltmarsh and Rick Bell were usually the fourth and fifth Concord runners and alternated positions.

Concord won the state meet easily with 27 points as compared to 105 points for runner-up Keene and 113 points for third place Memorial. Concord swept the top three places in the race (Maxfield, Morgan & Estabrook) with the top three times of all the classes. They were followed by Saltmarsh (9), Bell (12), Dave MacEachran (20) and Phil Jagemann (46).

Concord won the New England race but the team and coach were disappointed in the team score. It was a close race and the final team results were not available until two hours after the race. Concord (87) edged out New Bedford, MA (95) by 8 points for the title with Norwich Free, CT in third (101). Keene (221) and Memorial (315) placed 8th and 12th respectively. Ed Coleman of Plainville, CT was the individual winner. Pete Lorandeanu of Monadnock had a breakout race, finishing second in the race as the first NH finisher. Concord's scorers were Maxfield (7), Morgan (17), Estabrook (31), Bell (51) and MacEachran (58) followed by Saltmarsh (67) and Jagemann (102) in the field of 149 finishers (195 runners were entered). With the top 5 runners returning next year and only one senior (MacEacharan) in the top ten, Concord's goal for the following year was to not only have another undefeated season and repeat as winners of the state and New England races, but to dominate the New England race.

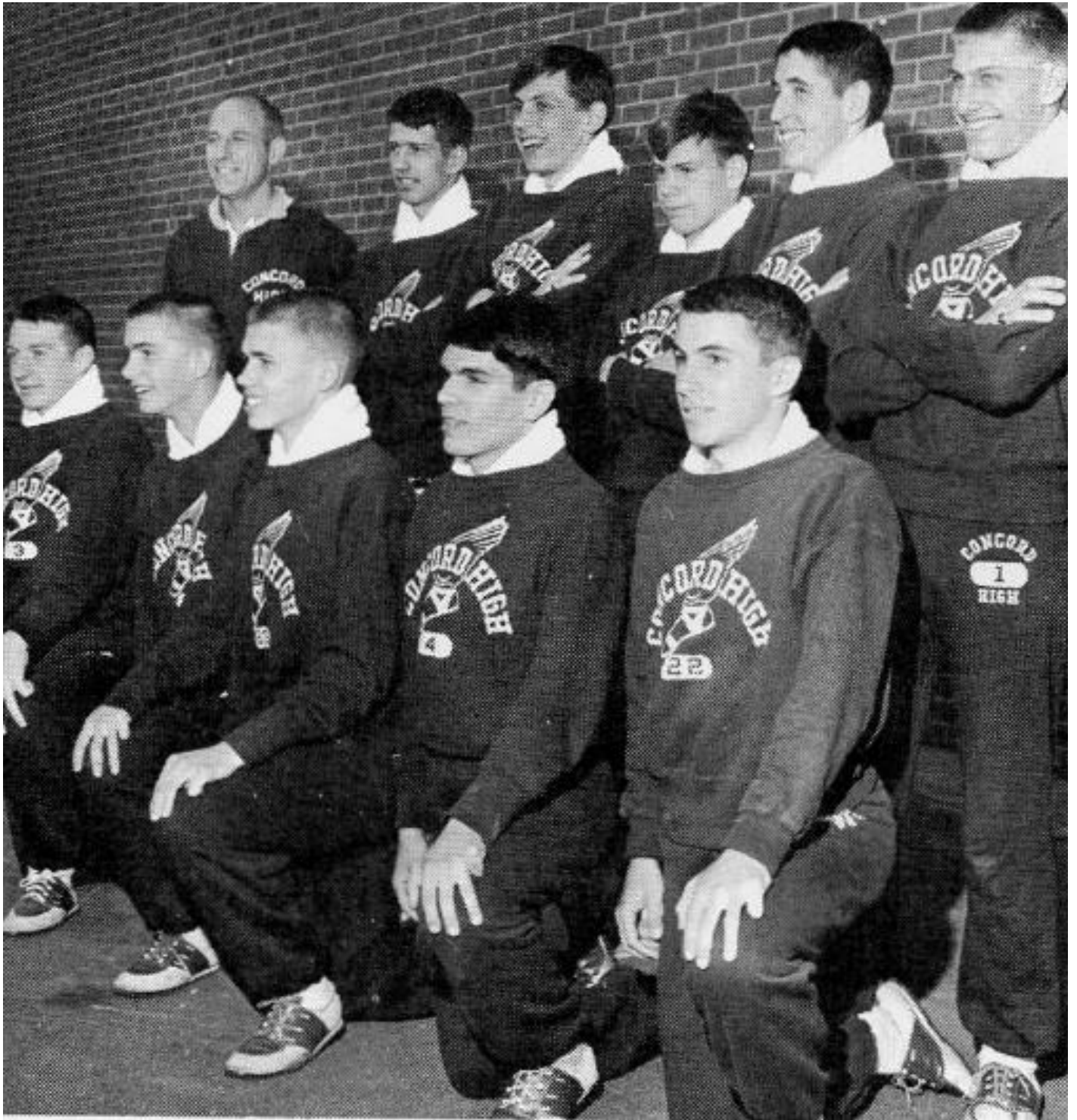
Up to 59 runners were on Concord's 1963 cross-country team. Led by Roger Maxfield, who won every race and set records on every course but the New Englands, Concord raced through an undefeated season, won both the state and New England championships and had the individual winner of the two meets in Roger Maxfield. Parker Morgan was second in every race during the season and the state meet and placed 5th in the New Englands. Alex Saltmarsh, Bob Estabrook and Rick Bell completed the top 5 for Concord in varying order until Bell had an ankle fracture and was lost for the season. Doug Nydegger became fifth man until he was injured and Gerry Love took over the fifth spot.

Coach Luti entered the team in a national invitational postal 2-mile race. Each team ran on a standard 400m track and sent in their top 5 times. Concord placed 5th out of 22 teams with Ossining, NY the winning team. The winning individual was a guy from Wichita, KS by the name of Jim Ryun. Concord places were Maxfield (4), Morgan (24), Estabrook (26), Saltmarsh (41) and Love (51) out of 110 runners.

Concord had a perfect score of 15 in 5 of the 8 regular season meets and a perfect score in the state meet, with Maxfield, Morgan, Estabrook, Saltmarsh and Gerry Love placing 1,2,3,4,5 respectively. Tom Forest was 7th and Phil Jagemann 19th. Two of the top six runners on the team (Bell & Nydegger) were injured during the season and unable to run at the end of the season, demonstrating the depth of talent on the team. Concord (15) easily out-distanced Memorial (83) and Portsmouth (91). Although the Meet of Champions (best teams and runners from all classes) was not implemented until later, a comparison of times from all classes revealed Concord to have the top four times for all classes. Gary Roberts of Stevens edged out Gerry Love for the fifth best time by one second.

Concord won the New Englands with Roger Maxfield the individual champion. This was the third undefeated season in a row and the second consecutive year of winning both the state and New England meets. This time, unlike the previous year, Concord dominated the New Englands, scoring 48 points to 119 for New Bedford, MA and 141 for Catholic Memorial (Roxbury), MA. Concord's finishers were Maxfield (1), Morgan (5), Saltmarsh (23), Love (25), Estabrook (26), Forest (60), and Phil Jagemann (68).

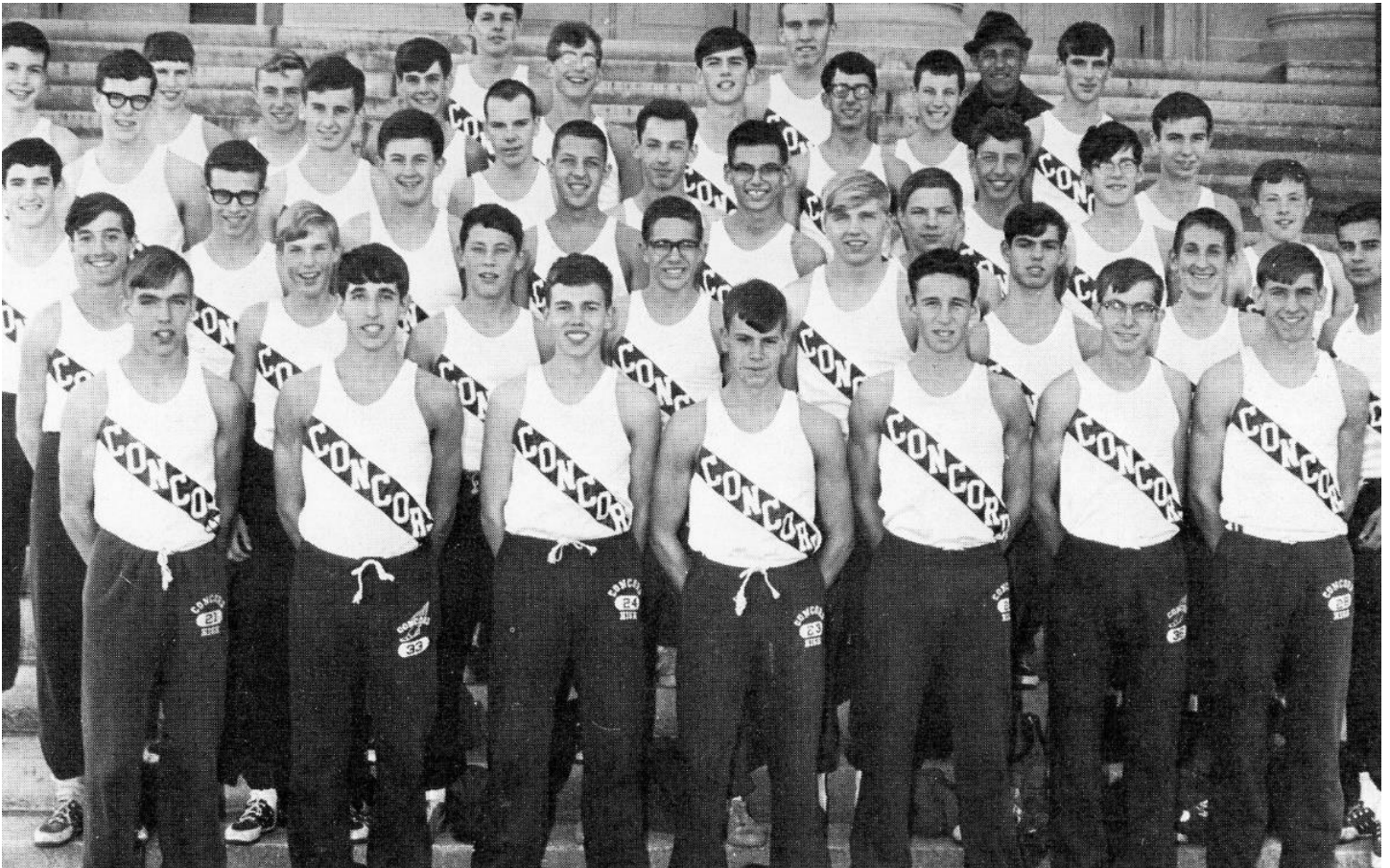
The top 5 runners at the beginning of the season last year graduated. For most teams, 1964 would have been a re-building year - but not Concord. Concord merely had a fourth straight undefeated season and won a third straight state and New England championship. The repeat championships reflect the amazing depth of Bill Luti's teams.

Doug Nydegger, top junior in 1963 before a leg injury ended his season, was the first Concord runner for the first two meets. Gerry Love was number one for the rest of the meets. Nydegger and newcomer Steve Smith were generally the number 2 or 3 runner and Dale Gage was 3rd or 4th. Phil Jagemann completed the top 5. Tom Forest began the season with a leg injury and was slowed for the season. He made it back into the top 7 towards the end of the season but never regained top form.

The team participated in two 2-mile postal competitions during the season. Concord (85) was second to York High, Elmhurst, IL (48) in the first race of 22 teams, 110 runners. Love, Nydegger, Smith, Gage and Jagemann placed 8, 13, 16, 19, and 28 respectively. Concord was again second to York High in the second race (a month later) in a field of 12 teams and 60 runners. Concord places were Love (6), Smith (7), Gage (8), Nydegger (23) and Forest (28). Jim Ryun was the winner of the second race in 9:10.

Concord won the state meet easily with 23 points over Keene (72) and Memorial (90). Gerry Love won the race with a thrilling race against Ken Klatka of Memorial. Concord's other finishers were Doug Nydegger (3), Steve Smith (4), Dale Gage (7), Phil Jagemann (8), Tom Forest (12) and Robert Sampson (41). Concord won the New Englands (110) followed by Masconomet Regional, MA (161) and Beverly, MA (166). New Hampshire's other teams were Stevens (209) and Keene (357) in 4th and 11th places respectively. Concord's finishers were Love (10), Smith (17), Gage (21), Nydegger (22), Jagemann (40), Forest (49) and Sampson (99). Art Dulong of Randolph, MA was the individual winner. Love was the first NH finisher. Jagemann competed on his third straight New England championship team - a unique accomplishment and the only NH runner to do this.

The 1965 team was led by co-captain Steve Smith who was Concord's number one runner in every race, won 7 of 9 regular season races and was second in the other two (and beaten by only one NH runner). He won the state meet and was 22nd in the New Englands. Bob Sampson was Concord's second runner for the first three races with George Curtis second for the remainder of the season. Jim Leary and Jon Kendall were generally 3rd and 4th runner until Sampson returned from injury to become fourth runner. Dick Hicks, Pete Daigle or Dick Piroso generally completed the top seven. This was Concord's fifth consecutive undefeated regular season and fourth consecutive team state championship. It was also the fourth consecutive year that a Concord High runner placed first in the state meet.

Concord placed 5th in a national Postal 2-mile competition of 11 teams and 55 runners. Smith placed 5th overall.

The state meet was held at Derryfield Park in Manchester in 1965 but would return to UNH the following year. Concord won the state meet with 53 points, followed by Portsmouth (56) and Keene (84). Concord's runners were Smith (1), Curtis (5), Leary (9), Sampson (18), Kendall (20), Hicks (28) and Daigle (45). Massachusetts teams swept the New Englands with Randolph 1st (151) followed by Catholic Memorial (210) and New Bedford (213). Concord was the first NH team, placing 5th with 315 points. Portsmouth (335) and Winnacunnet (388) placed 6th and 10th respectively. Art Dulong of Randolph, MA won the race of 143 runners for the second straight year. Concord's finishers were Smith (22), Curtis (26), Leary (82), Sampson (83), Dick Hicks (102), Kendall (105) and Pete Daigle (121).

Comments:

In the third race of the season, with 3 of their top 7 runners out with injuries - including the number one runner, Concord was beaten by Winnacunnet by 5 points. This was big news in Concord. It was front page, top of the fold headline news in the Concord Monitor. It was the first time the Concord cross-country team had been beaten in a regular season race since the last meet in 1960. The winning streak was 42 races against 59 teams over a 6 year period. Concord also lost the following week to Keene, again by 5 points.

Jon Kendall won the first race of the season. He missed the next two races with injuries and it took a couple more races before he was once again number one. Dick Hicks was the first Concord runner during this time, followed closely by sophomore Walt Chadwick. After Kendall returned to number one status, Hicks and Chadwick alternated as second and third runner. Ronnie Woods, Steve Heath or Jack Nelson generally completed the top five.

Concord (76) placed second to Keene (42) in the Monadnock Invitational Division A race with Winnacunnet (77) a close third. The race had 13 teams and 90 runners. Concord places were Hicks (11), Chadwick (14), Woods (16), Nelson (17), Kendall (18), Heath (26) and Roger Jobin (68).

Keene won the state meet with 39 points, followed by Portsmouth (59) and Concord (72). Keene swept the first three places. Winnacunnet, which had beaten Concord earlier in the season, ran in the Class I race, but Concord's team time was better and qualified as the third NH team for the New Englands. Concord's finishers in the state meet were Kendall (6), Chadwick (12), Woods (13), Heath (17), Hicks (24), Nelson (25) and John Auger (36) out of 97 runners.

Brockton, MA (153) won the New Englands with Keene second (182). Concord (352) was 6th of 15 teams as the 2nd NH school, nudging out Portsmouth who was 7th with 353 points. Ron Wayne of Brockton, MA was the individual winner. Concord runners were Kendall (40), Hicks (71), Chadwick (74), Woods (77), Heath (90), Nelson (102) and Auger (116).

Comments:

Concord began the year with 47 runners. Jon Kendall was the number one Concord runner for the first 5 races of the season, with Walt Chadwick second. Chadwick was number one for the remaining 3 regular season races and in the state and New England races. Ronnie Woods was the number 3 runner for the first 4 races but a leg injury hampered later efforts and he was unable to run in the state or New England races. Brian Smith and Jack Nelson completed the top five and, after Woods injury, Alan Paige joined the top five.

Concord ran in two national 2-mile Postal races. Kendall was first for Concord in the October race and Chadwick first in November. Concord was 8th of 16 teams in the second race with Chadwick 13th of 80 runners (9:57.3).

Concord had an undefeated regular season with 3 perfect scores. They won the state meet with 33 points, followed by Keene (61) and Winnacunnet (100). The race was won by Tim Mayes of Keene. Concord runners were Chadwick (2), Kendall (4), Smith (8), Nelson (9), Paige (10), Carl Nydegger (21) and Peter Robinson (29).

Concord (222) was New England runner-up to Brockton, MA (125). Keene (229) was 4th and Bishop Brady, who was the state Class I champ, was 8th (327). James Hall of Newington, CT won the race with Gerry Pregent of Keene in 16th place as New Hampshire's first finisher. Concord's places were Chadwick (31), Smith (36), Kendall (43), Nelson (53), Paige (59), Robinson (72) and Nydegger (98).

After two losses and a third place state meet finish last year, Concord returned to the top in 1967 and began another streak of 3 straight undefeated seasons and 4 straight state championships.

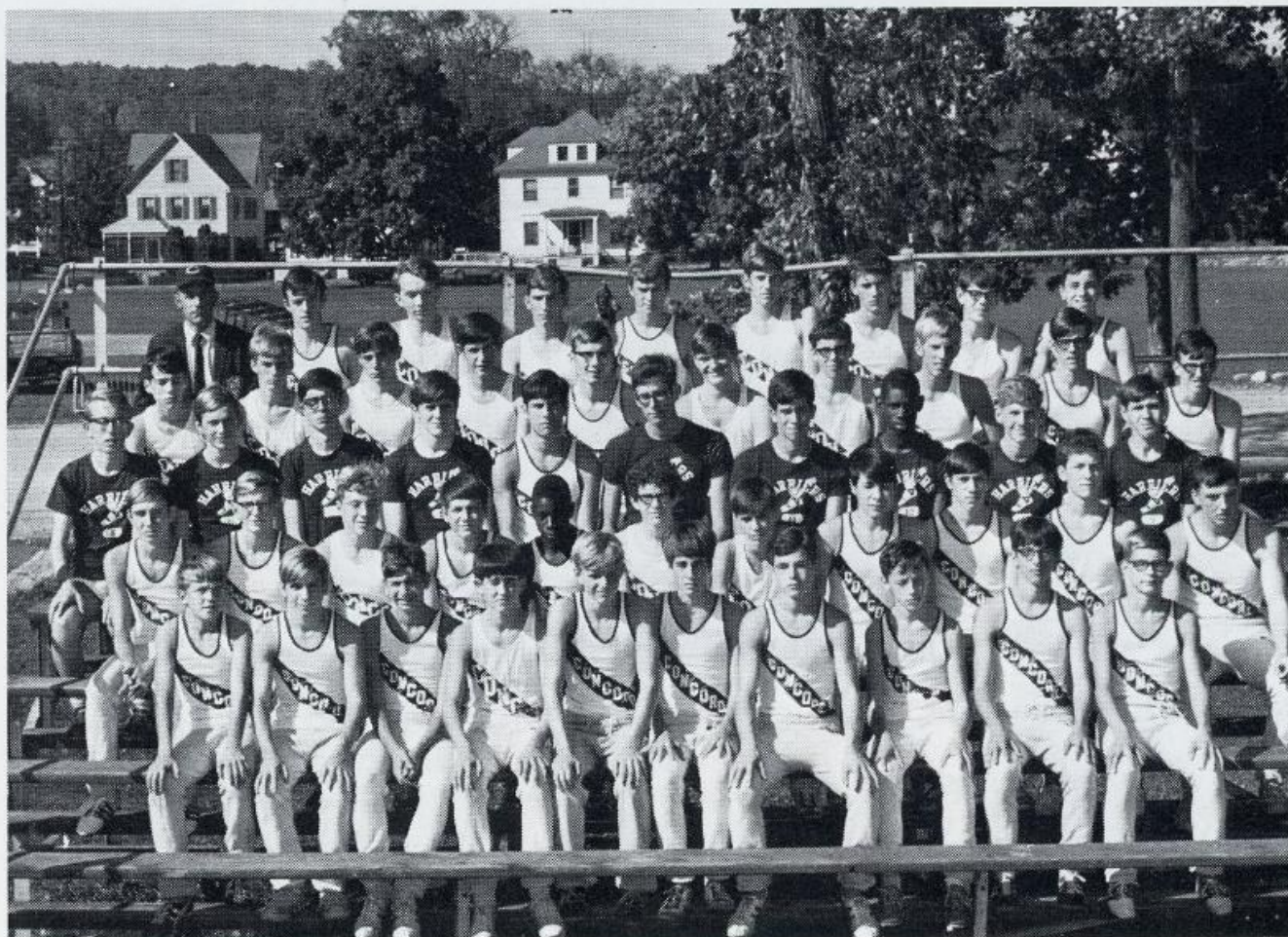
Concord once again had an undefeated regular season and won the state meet. Walt Chadwick was the number one runner for Concord and was beaten in the regular season by only Bruce Butterworth of Winnacunnet, Dave Goldsmith of Keene and teammate Alan Paige in one race. Paige was Concord's number two runner in all the other races. Jim Minichiello and Carl Nydegger were generally 3rd and 4th runners with Steve Bunten in the mix at times. George Stohrer came on strong in the second half of the season to become the 5th or 6th runner.

Concord beat Keene by 4 points during the regular season, won the rest of the meets easily and had three perfect scores of 15. They participated twice in the national 2-mile Postal invitational race where teams around the country run 2 miles on the track and send in their top 5 times. In the second race the time spread between Concord's top 5 runners was only 19 seconds, showing great grouping. Chadwick was first for Concord in 9:58.

Concord won the state meet with 38 points to 65 for Keene and 83 for Winnacunnet. Bruce Butterworth of Winnacunnet was first in the race, followed by Walt Chadwick of Concord. The other Concord finishers were Paige (6), Bunten (8), Minichiello (10), Nydegger (12), Stohrer (14) and Peter Robinson (18). Although winners, Coach Luti was somewhat disappointed in the times and thought they could do better.

Concord tied for third in the New Englands with 254 points behind Brockton, MA (190) and Boston College High (203). The individual winner was Danny Moynihan of Malden Catholic, MA. The other NH teams were Keene in 6th (280) and Brady in 7th (292) in the field of 15 teams. Total runners were 141 and NH's first runner was Neil Ackley of Brady in 14th place. Again Coach Luti was disappointed in the team's performance as he felt going in that they had a chance to win the race. Concord's runners were Chadwick (33), Paige (51), Minichiello (55), Bunten (56), Stohrer (59), Robinson (84) and Nydegger (86).

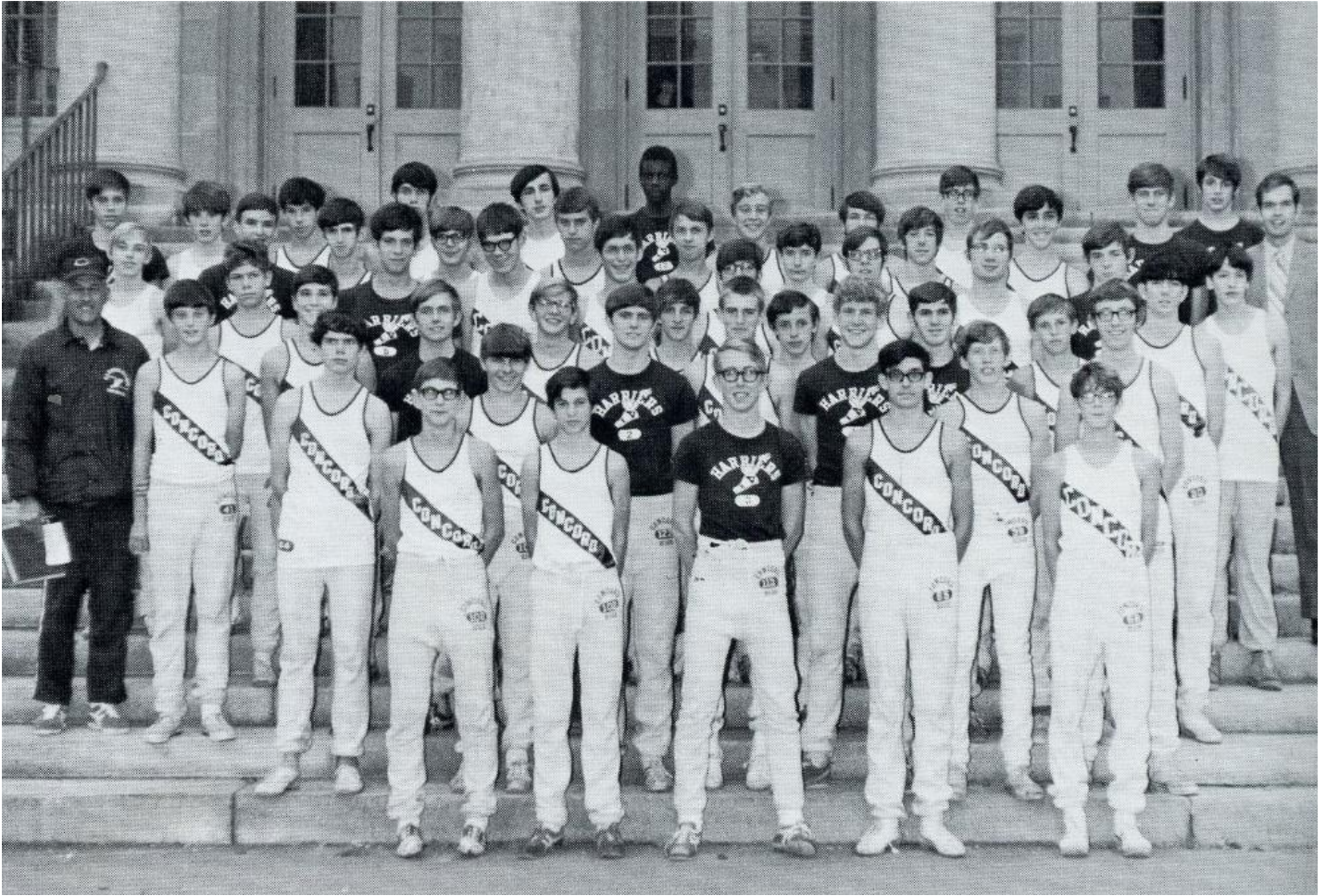
Concord began the 1969 season as an untested team (7 of the top 10 in 1968 graduated) with no dominant runner and fewer runners on the team (38) than in previous years. Coach Luti expected Keene and Brady to be the top teams. What Concord did have was good grouping and the times of the group improved during the year. They ended the season with a third straight undefeated season and third straight state championship. Five of their nine regular season meets were won with perfect scores of 15. George Stohrer tended to be the number one runner at the beginning of the year and Lee Hafemann was number one at the end of the season. Jim Minichiello, Andy Vogt, and Dan Tromblay generally interchanged positions 3, 4 and 5 with Channing Snyder and Tom Atherton placing in the top 5 at times.

Keene and Winnacunnet had top runners but not the depth of Concord. A close showdown with Brady was expected as Brady had both a top runner (Bill Luti, son of Concord's coach) and depth, but Concord dominated the meet, placing 7 runners behind the winner Billy Luti. Concord participated in two 2-mile postal races, placing 2nd of 8 teams in the first and 3rd of 11 teams in the second. Hafemann was Concord's top runner in both races.

Concord won the state meet (34 points) followed by Keene (76) and Winnacunnet (123). Bruce Butterworth of Winnacunnet repeated as state champion. Keene's Dave Goldsmith and Peter Harris were second and third but Concord's grouping won out as Concord runners were Hafemann (4), Stohrer (5), Tromblay (7), Snyder (8), Minichiello (10), Atherton (13) and Andy Vogt (14). Brady won Class I and qualified for the New Englands as the second best NH team.

Concord (288) was fifth in the New Englands behind Foxboro, MA (135), Pilgrim, RI (140) and St. Mary's of Lynn, MA (221). Brady was 9th and Keene 10th. Jim Euell of Norwich Free Academy, CT won the race of 140 runners (CT sent their top runners but no teams). Bruce Butterworth (3) and Dave Goldsmith (7) were the top NH runners. Concord runners were Hafemann (41), Snyder (51), Tromblay (62), Minichiello (65), Vogt (69), Atherton (75) and Stohrer (85).

Comments:

Concord was undefeated by NH teams in 1970, won both the state and New England championships and had the individual state and New England champion in Tom Atherton. Concord was beaten by Wachusetts Regional, MA in the Capital City Invitational quad meet at White Park.

Concord began the season with two outstanding runners in Dan Tromblay and Lee Hafemann, but Coach Luti was concerned with the large time gap between these two runners and the 3 - 4 - and 5 runners. Dan and Lee broke Roger Maxfield's 1963 White Park course record in the Keene race. Tom Atherton, who wasn't in the top 5 at the beginning of the season, gradually improved his times until he caught up with Dan and Lee by the Brady meet.

Concord (27) was 1st in the 'A' Division of the Monadnock Invitational, followed by Brady (57) and Keene (76) out of 7 teams. Hafemann and Tromblay placed 1 and 2 in the race ahead of Brady's Bill Luti in third.

Concord ran in two 2-mile postal races, placing 1st of 9 teams in the 2nd race. Hafemann (9:45), Tromblay, Atherton, Snyder and Freeman placed 4-5-6-15-24 in the race. The total time of the 5 runners was 49:38, a school record (see Table B-12). The results were submitted to the USTFF where Concord placed 18th of 120 schools (13 of the 17 schools ahead of Concord were from California).

In their fourth straight state championship Concord (23) easily won the state meet over Keene (73). In the first race he ever won, Tom Atherton won the state meet by 0.1 seconds over Richard Osborne of Winnacunnet. These two were followed by three more Concord runners as Hafemann, Tromblay and Channing Snyder took places 3 - 4 - and 5. Concord's other finishers were Guy Freeman (10) Jim Langley (13) and Al Boissy (24). Brady won the Class I race and was the second best NH team.

The following week Concord (83) won the New Englands over Burlington, VT (131) and Brockton, MA (132). Brady was 6th (243) and Keene 9th (331). Atherton originally placed 6th but the top 5 runners and a total of 7 runners were disqualified for cutting a large corner on the course and Atherton was declared the winner.

Concord's other finishers were Tremblay (5), Hafemann (8), Snyder (14), Freeman (55), Langley (95) and Boissy (97). Concord avenged its earlier loss to Wachusetts Regional by beating them handily in the New England race.

Comments:

Concord lost the top 8 runners from last year. They had a good grouping of runners at the beginning of the season but no outstanding ones. Erwin Ames, John Varrill and Don Maddox all won races during the first half of the season. Steve Foote came on strong and was the number one runner for the last half of the season. These four runners along with Dan Welch generally comprised the top five runners. Concord won most of the meets easily (the first three by perfect scores), squeaked by Keene and lost to Brady (the last time Concord lost to a NH team was to Keene in 1966). This was the fourth match-up between Concord and Brady with Concord winning the first three.

Concord hosted the 2nd Annual Tri-state Invitational (it was called the Capital City Invitational last year) on Oct 23rd where they placed 2nd to Burlington, VT. The idea behind the meet was to invite top teams from out of state to help prepare Concord for the state and New England races. Concord participated twice in the 2-mile postal race with Maddox leading Concord in the first race and Foote leading in the second race.

Concord placed third in the state meet and failed to qualify for the New Englands after 10 straight years of qualifying (1960 was the last time Concord did not qualify as a team for the New England race). Team scores were Keene (43), Pinkerton Academy (74) and Concord (79). Concord had narrowly beaten Keene during the regular season. Joe Richardson of Pinkerton Academy won the race. Concord's places were Foote (3), Varrill (7), Ames (17), Maddox (19), Dan Freeman (33), Bob Monier (34) and D. Welch (37). Brady won the Class I meet, had the fastest aggregate team time of all the classes and John P. Savoie of Brady had the fastest time of the day.

Pilgrim High of Warwick, RI won the New England race (111), followed by Springfield Cathedral, MA (158) and Apponoquet Regional, MA (172). Brady was 5th (274), Pinkerton 9th and Keene 11th. Richard Bourie of Springfield Cathedral was the winning runner. Brady's Savoie was 3rd and Steve Foote, Concord's lone qualifier, was 61st.

Comments:

The number one spot for Concord was wide open at the beginning of the season. The top 4 runners of last year graduated and the three tri-captains listed above and elected at the end of last season were gone: Hafemann and Wright moved out of Concord and Chuck Welch was out with a bad knee (he did run later in the season but never reached top form). Chuck was the lone captain for the team. Mark Warren was the first Concord runner in 5 of the 9 regular season races. He did not run in the other 4 races and did not run in the state meet as his religion prohibited him from racing or training on Saturdays. Dan Welch, Mike Freeman, Russ Cutting and Bob Philbrook each won one of the other 4 races. Bob Monier was generally the number 2 or 3 runner.

This was Concord's worse season since 1958, losing 3 of the 9 regular season races to Winnacunnet, Keene and Brady. Concord won the 3rd annual Capital City Invitational on Oct 21st, beating tops schools from the three other northern New England states. D. Welch had Concord's best time in the 2-mile postal race.

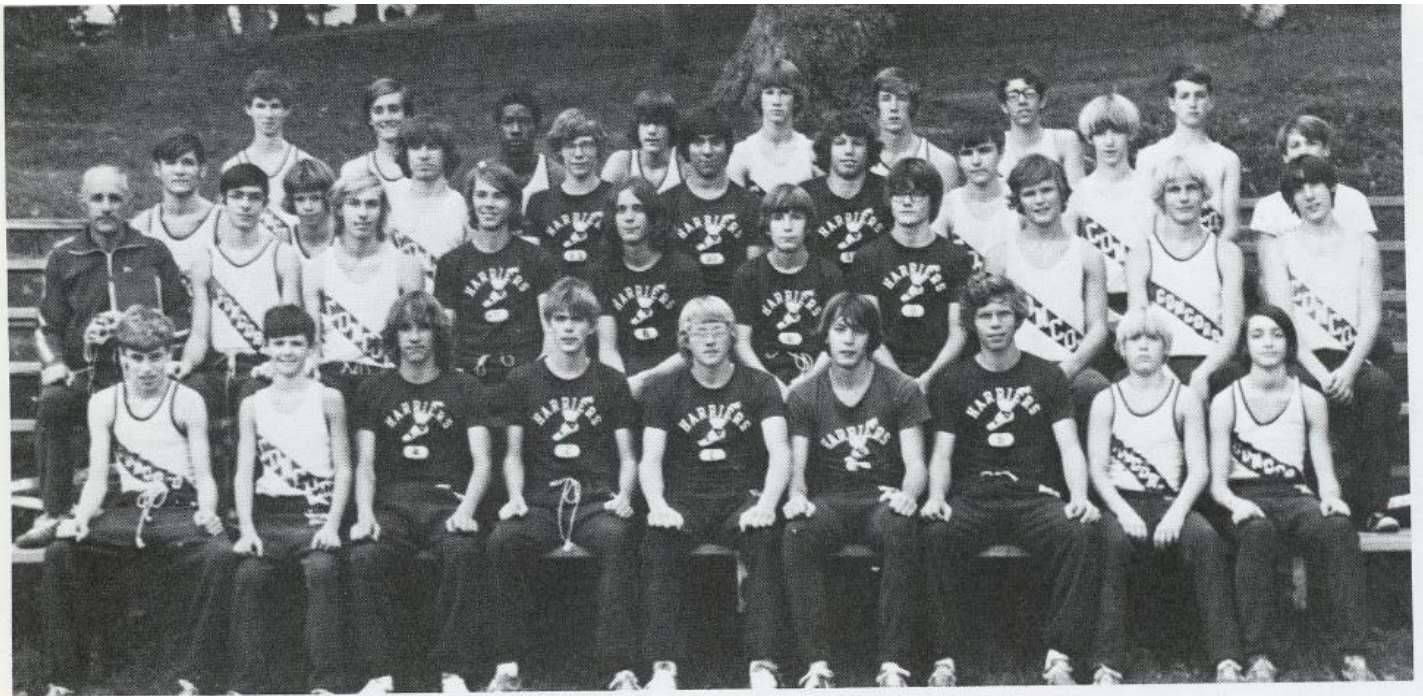
Concord (112) placed fifth in the state meet. The race was won by Dave Richardson of Pinkerton in a thrilling race with George Reed of Central; both were given the same time. Keene (55) won the race followed by Portsmouth (57) and Winnacunnet (78). Concord's places were D. Welch 13, Philbrook 21, Monier 25, Cutting 26, Brian Ackley 27, Ken Craigue 44 and Mike Freeman 61. This was the first and only time during Coach Luti's tenure that he did not have at least one runner in the top 10 in the state meet. Brady won the Class I race and qualified for the New Englands behind Keene and Portsmouth.

J.P. Savoie of Bishop Brady won the New England race. Pilgrim High of Warwick, RI (110) won the team title, followed by Wakefield, MA (160) and LaSalle Academy, RI (175). Brady (359) placed 10th as the second NH team, behind 6th place Keene (282). No one from CHS was in the race.

All seven CHS runners in the state meet were underclassman including sophomores Bob Philbrook, Russ Cutting and Brian Ackley, suggesting a promising season next year.

Comments:

Concord avenged its three losses of last year by easily defeating Winnacunnet, Keene and Brady (note: Harvey Smith was no longer Brady's coach). Concord had an undefeated season, won most meets by perfect scores, won the state meet, had the number one and two runners in the state meet and was runner-up in the New Englands.

Concord was led by Russ Cutting, who was first for Concord in 9 of the 12 races and by Brian Ackley, who was first in the other three. One of them placed first in all the races except the NE Cross-Country Championship, the Capital City Invitational (20 Oct.) and the New Englands. Mike Freeman, Dan Welch and Bob Philbrick generally completed the top five for Concord. Concord was second out of 12 schools to Wachusetts in the NE cross-country championship (also called the Burlington Relays) but Concord returned the favor in the Capital City Invitational by beating Wachusetts by one point. Robin Snyder was first for Concord in the girl's race, placing third. Joan Benoit, Cape Elizabeth, ME was 2nd in the race.

Concord (34) easily won the 12 team Class L state meet, followed by Keene (81) and Salem (111). Fifteen teams were in the race but 3 teams did not have 5 finishers and were not considered official teams. Cutting and Ackley swept the top two places in the state meet. Brady won its 7th straight Class I title and qualified for the New Englands. Concord finishers were Cutting (1), Ackley (2), Welch (4), Freeman (13), Philbrick (14), Ken Craigue (15) and Mike Duprey (16). Concord (127) was runner-up in the New Englands to Pilgrim High, Warwick, RI (79) who won a 3rd straight New England title. H. Barlow of Deering, ME was the overall winner. Brady was 11th in the 12 team meet (Massachusetts did not participate and Connecticut has not sent teams since 1963). Russ Cutting was NH's first runner in sixth place. Other Concord runners were Ackley (14), Welch (21), Philbrick (38), Freeman (48), Ken Craigue (65) and Mike Duprey (66). Concord's top 3 runners in the New Englands were the top 3 runners from New Hampshire.

Comments:

Concord began the season with last year's state champ and runner-up in Russ Cutting and Brian Ackley. Steve Aldrich provided a good third runner but there was a gap to the 4th and 5th runners. Ackley was first for Concord for the first 6 races (thru 10/5) with Cutting 2nd and Aldrich 3rd. Bob Philbrick and Jim Hein were generally the 4th and 5th runners. Ackley was out sick with the shingles for the next 4 races (thru 10/22 and including the two losses) and Aldrich was out for a couple races. Cutting was first in these races and Mark Wilson and Peter Gamble moved into the top 5 runners. Ackley returned for the last regular season meet and the state meet and was 2nd for Concord to Cutting in these races. Cutting had issues with severe bronchitis towards the end of the season.

Concord had two losses during the season to Brady and Nashua and beat Laconia by one point when Laconia's number 1 runner was out. Ackley placed fourth and the team placed fourth in the 20-team large school division of the Our Lady of Providence Invitational that included teams from New York as well as other New England states. Concord won the Capital City Invitational on 19 October against a top team from the other three northern New England states. A girl's race was held as part of the invitational consisting of 123 girls from 17 schools. Robin Snyder was Concord's first runner placing fifth. Concord (112) placed 3rd in the state meet behind Laconia (58) and Nashua (95) and did not qualify for the New Englands. B. J. Fowler of Laconia, who did not run in the dual meet with Concord, won the race. Cutting and Ackley placed 6th and 7th respectively in the race. Concord's other runners were Philbrick (21), Wilson (38), Gamble (40), Jay Smith (42) and Aldrich (43). Sickness (Ackley & Cutting) and injury (Aldrich) played a major role in Concord's less than stellar performance in the state meet. Brady placed 2nd in the Class I race and qualified for the New Englands. Bruce Bickford of Lawrence, ME won the New England race. Toll Gate of Warwick, RI (91) won the race with Pilgrim High, RI (104) in second. The NH teams were Laconia (161) 3rd, Kingswood Regional (199) 5th and Brady (303) 9th.

Comments:

Concord began the season with the smallest squad in years (less than 30 runners) and only two top 7 runners from last year that ran in the state meet - co-captains Jay Smith and Steve Aldrich. Smith and Aldrich were the top runners for Concord during the season with Smith first for Concord in 5 of the 8 regular season races and Aldrich first in the other 3. In the state meet, however, Peter Gamble was Concord's first runner, finishing 10th. During the season Gamble, Jay Sweeney and Dana Poole were generally the 3, 4 and 5 runners.

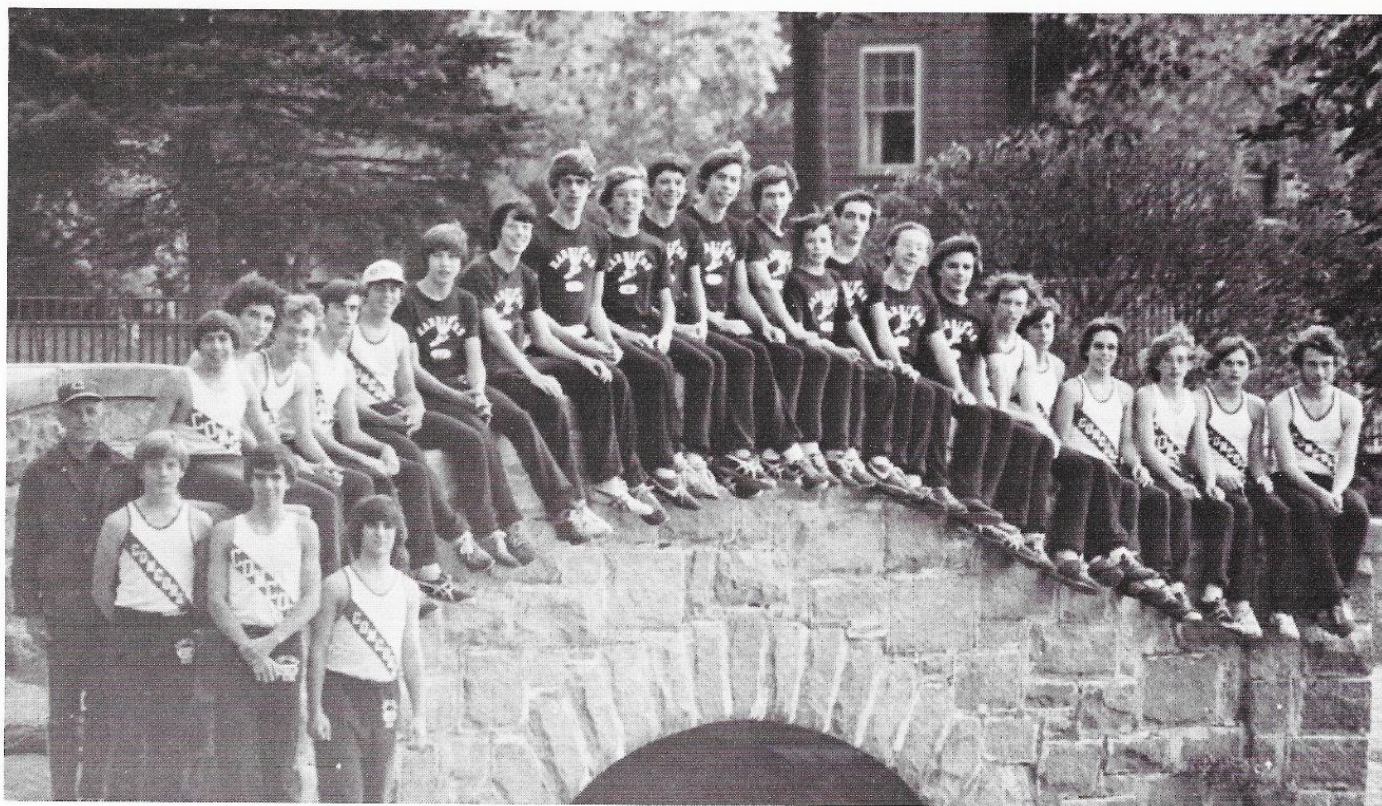
Concord lost its first race of the season to defending state champ Laconia with B.J. Fowler of Laconia the winner. Concord then ran off 7 straight wins. The White Park course record was broken on October 7th by Larry Reed of Central. Concord squeaked by Brady by one point and Coach Luti was disappointed with the times.

Concord (94) was second in the state Class L meet to Laconia (36). Larry Reed of Central won the race and last year's winner, BJ Fowler, was second. Concord's runners were Gamble (10), Smith (13), Aldrich (14), Sweeney (16), Poole (41), Jim Arsenault (47) and Scott Emmons (51). Laconia, Kingswood and Timberlane were the three NH teams that qualified for the New Englands (Concord was 4th).

The Concord girls had their first official varsity season, finishing with a 4 - 2 record and a 7th place finish in the first ever girls' state meet. Concord's top runners were Kathy Kirsch and Sue Wechsler. Girl's coach Christine Robinson acknowledged relying heavily on advice from Mr. Luti.

Pilgrim High of Warwick, RI (134) won the New Englands with South Portland, ME (149) second. Laconia was 4th with 179 points. Timberlane (231) and Kingswood (258) were 7th and 10th respectively out of 12 teams (no MA or CT teams). John Murphy of Portsmouth Abbey, RI was the individual winner with BJ Fowler the first NH finisher in 4th place.

Comments:

Two innovations were introduced for the 1976 season. First, courses were lengthened from the typical 2.5 miles to 5 kilometers or 3.1 miles. Secondly, a state meet (later called Meet of Champions - MOC) was added that allowed the best teams and runners from the 4 state class meets to run in the same race to select the teams for the New Englands.

Concord began the season with three good runners, tri-captains Peter Gamble, Jay Sweeney and Dana Poole, but with a big time gap to the 4th and 5th runners. Sweeney and Gamble were either 1st or 2nd for Concord in every race and usually within a few seconds of each other. Sweeney was first in 5 of the 8 regular season races and the New Englands and Gamble was 1st in the other 3 regular season races as well as the state class and MOC races. Poole was 3rd in every race. Peter Alexander was generally the 4th runner at the beginning of the season but a leg injury forced him to miss the last half of the season. Ken Jones and freshman Moe Fairley were generally the 4th and 5th runners for the last half of the season.

Concord (103) was 4th in the state class L meet behind Laconia (47), Pinkerton (86) and Memorial (99). B.J. Fowler of Laconia won the race. Concord's scorers were Gamble (5), Sweeney (7), Poole (14), Jones (34) and Fairley (43), followed by Jay Flanders (47) and Mark Saltmarsh (59) out of 99 runners. Concord was also 4th in the MOC with Laconia first. Mark Kimball of Timberland won the race, followed by his brother Dean and Fowler. Concord's finishers were Gamble (6), Sweeney (9), Poole (22), Jones (37), Fairley (44), Jay Flanders (47) and Mark Saltmarsh (52).

Concord did not qualify for the New Englands but Gamble and Sweeney qualified as top 10 finishers. In the New England race, Sweeney finished 10th and Gamble 12th. The race was won by Joe Belyea of South Portland, ME with Mark Kimball second and B.J. Fowler 3rd. Waterville, ME (141) won the team title over South Portland, ME (165). Pinkerton (187) was the top NH team in 5th place with Laconia (227) 6th and Memorial (241) 8th of 12 teams (again, no MA or CT teams).

Comments:

Concord began the season with 6 of the top 11 runners from last year and what Coach Luti termed "a good group of runners but not of championship caliber". The top three runners were Peter Finney, Moe Fairley and Andy Snyder and usually in that order. Peter Alexander, Dana Ward or Ken Jones generally rounded out the top five. Concord lost to Keene, Memorial and Laconia during the regular season but beat Keene in the state meet. They won the first annual Capital Area Invitational on 15 October, beating Brady, Merrimack Valley and Pembroke (ns = no score for Pembroke – only 4 finishers).

Concord (136) placed 5th in the state Class L race, won by Memorial (55) and followed by Pinkerton (63), Laconia (85) and Portsmouth (106). B.J. Fowler of Laconia was the individual winner. Peter Finney placed 10th and qualified for the MOC but the team did not. Concord's other runners were Snyder (27), Ward (30), Fairley (34), Jones (35), Alexander (45) and Mark Saltmarsh (65).

The top three teams in the MOC were Pinkerton (71), Memorial (94) and Laconia (100). Mark Kimball of Timberlane was first in the race, followed by B.J. Fowler. Concord's lone entry Peter Finney placed 33rd.

New Hampshire had the top 3 teams in the New England race with Memorial (106) on top again followed by Pinkerton (152) and Laconia (170). Mark Kimball won the race and B.J. Fowler was 4th. Beth Clark of Brady won the New England's girls race after placing 2nd in the MOC.

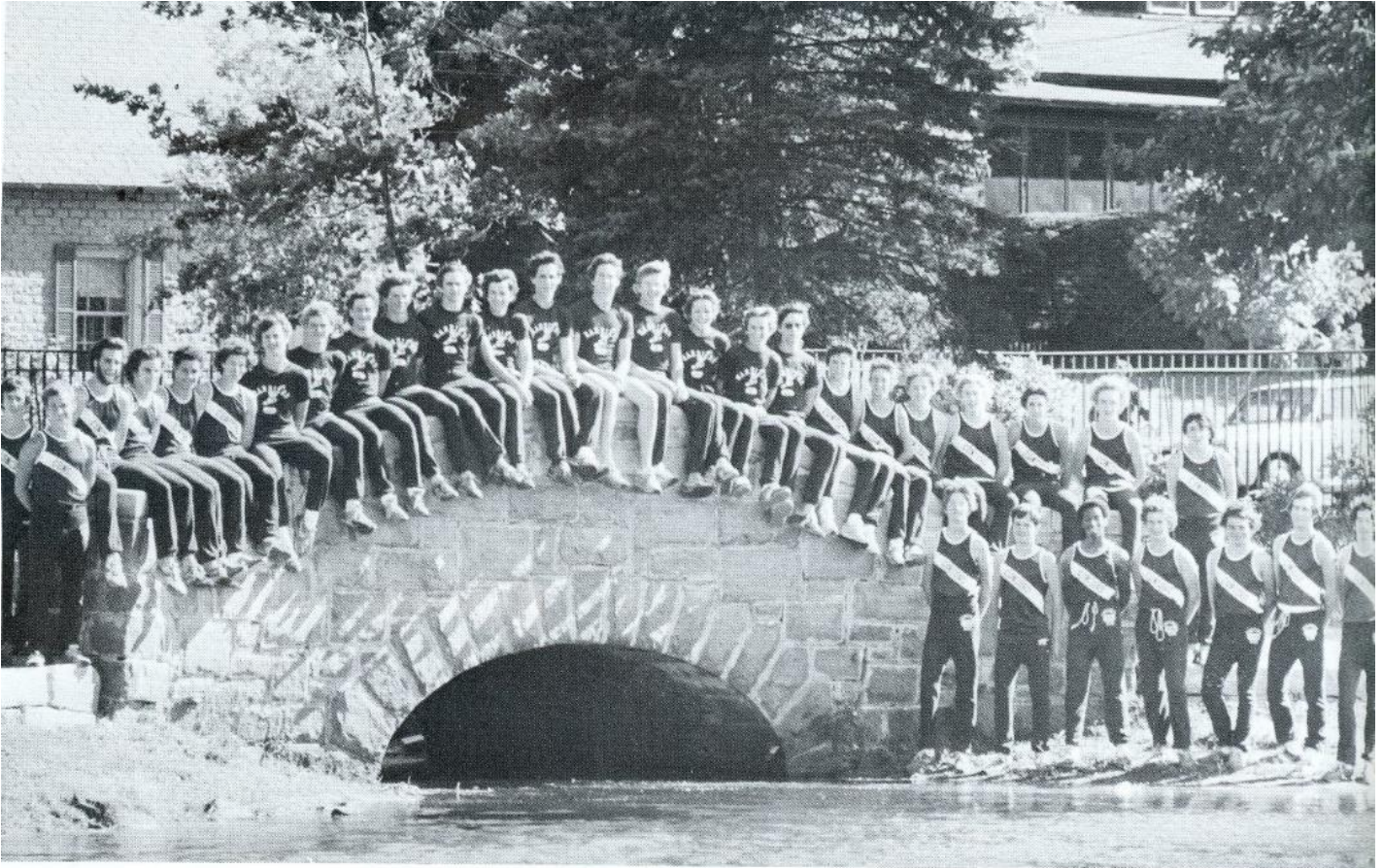
Despite the running boom taking place in the public, Concord began the season with a small team of about 20 runners. The runners were of high quality however and expected to contend for the state title. Andy Snyder, elected co-captain along with Jim Howe at the end of the previous season, decided not to run his senior season. Peter Finney and Moe Fairley were the top two runners for Concord. Finney was bothered by shin splints during the season and missed some races and was below par in others. In the 11 races, Fairley was first in 6 and Finney in 5. Bernie Chase was generally the 3rd runner at the beginning of the season but Dave Lyons came on strong at mid-season to be number three runner and Chase left the team later in the season. Bryan Nowell and Doug MacPherson generally rounded out the top five.

Concord won the 2nd annual Capital Area Invitational on Oct. 14th. Concord lost to Keene and Nashua during the regular season and placed third to them in the state Class L meet. However, Concord was within 4 points of first place Keene and 1 point of Nashua after losing handily to them during the season. The top scores were Keene (89), Nashua (92) and Concord (93). The winning individual was Mike Gagne of Nashua. Concord's places were Fairley (8), Finney (9), Lyons (17), Nowell (28), MacPherson (31), Jim Howe (42) and Dave Simonton (51). The race was held at the White Mountain Country Club in Ashland. Concord (135) did not run as well at the Meet of Champions, placing 4th behind Keene (89), Nashua (105) and Memorial (123). Mike Gagne was again the first place finisher. No Concord runner nor the team qualified for the New England race, which was a disappointment. Concord's finishers in the MOC were Finney (16), Fairley (19), Nowell (29), Lyons (32), MacPherson (39), Howe (47) and Simonton (62).

Derren Rojas of Bishop Hendricken, RI won the New Englands and the team title was also won by Bishop Hendricken. Keene placed 2nd in the race and Dave Lawlor of Keene was the first NH finisher in 3rd place. ME, MA & CT did not run in the New England race.

Comments:

The 1979 team returned 5 of the top 7 runners from the previous year and was "the best team on paper since the 1973 champs" according to Coach Luti. Peter Finney was the number one runner for Concord in every race. Moe Fairley, Dave Lyons and Bryan Nowell generally took the 2-3-4 spots in various order with Dave Simonton, Derek Underwood, Dean Starrett or Dan Warren completing the top 7.

Concord was undefeated during the regular season, placed 9th in the Coates Memorial (top) division of the Our Lady of Providence Invitational (Finney was 9th), placed 6th in the Grand Knight (top) Division of the KC Invitational (Finney was 6th) and swept the top 8 places in the Capital Area Invitational (Oct. 13th race) led by Finney, Lyons and Fairley.

The Class L meet, held at Derryfield after years at UNH, was won by Concord (74) over Exeter (91) and Nashua (93). Concord's finishers were Finney (2), Lyons (5), Fairley (9), Nowell (26), Underwood (32), Simonton (33), and Starrett (54). The following week Concord (88) placed first in the MOC, again besting Exeter (100) and Nashua (127). Concord's places were Finney (5), Fairley (13), Lyons (16), Nowell (19), Simonton (35), Underwood (50) and Starrett (75).

In a somewhat diminished New England race (only NH, VT & RI competed) Concord (118) placed second behind Bishop Hendrickson of Rhode Island (56). Concord tied Cumberland, RI for second after tallying the top 5 runners, but won the tie breaker with their 6th runner. Concord's order was Finney (7), Lyons (24), Fairley (31), Nowell (54), Underwood (62), Simonton (68) and Starrett (91).

Barbara Higgins ran her first cross-country season as a junior and was number one for Concord throughout the season. She placed 4th in the New Englands (3rd NH runner) after placing 9th and 10th in the Class L and MOC races respectively.

Comments:

Concord lost the top two runners from last year and began the season with a small squad (23 runners) but had some quality runners. They also began the season with no school. Concord High did not open until October because of striking steel workers during the renovation of the school. Double sessions were held at Rundlett: high school in the AM and Jr. high in the PM.

Dave Lyons and Bryan Nowell were the number one and two runners for Concord. The rest of the top 5 positions were variously filled by Derek Underwood, Tom Gamble, Tom Johnson, John Prendergast, Scott Conn or Jon Rummler.

Concord was undefeated during the regular season, again won the Capital City Invitational on Oct. 11th and placed 8th of 12 teams in the Grand Knight (top) Division of the Knights of Columbus Invitational (Lyons was 17th). Concord (80) won the Class L meet over Pinkerton (134) and Memorial (136). The winner was Dave Meare of Salem. Concord's finishers were Lyons (3), Nowell (8), T. Johnson (12), Underwood (20), Gamble (37), Rummler (56) and Prendergast (62). Concord (139) also won the Meet of Champions over Hanover (157) and Oyster River (188), with Dave Westover of Stevens the race winner. Concord's places were Lyons (5), Nowell (23), T. Johnson (25), Underwood (29), Gamble (57), Conn (70) and Rummler (94). For the second year in a row only NH, VT and RI competed in the New Englands and Bishop Hendricken (160) repeated as the winning team over Union, VT (175) and Cumberland, RI (182). Concord (251) was the first NH team, placing 6th (Hanover, Oyster River and Pinkerton were 9, 11 & 12 respectively). Shawn Gardner of Union, VT placed first with Dave Westover in 2nd place as the first NH finisher. Concord runners were Lyons (10), Underwood (43), Nowell (45), Gamble (76), Prendergast (77), T. Johnson (84) and Conn (95).

Barbara Higgins placed second in the New England race and the Concord girls team placed third. Cathy Schiro of Dover won the N.E. women's race, her 1st of 5 straight N.E. championships.

Comments:

Concord began the season with only 2 of the top 7 runners from the previous year. Jon Rummler and Scott Johnson alternated between number one and two runner throughout the season. The rest of the top 5 was filled variously with Chris Mamos, Derek Underwood, Mark LaRoche, and Todd Philbrick. Concord (199) placed 5th in the Manchester Invitational which was led by Winnacunnet (139), Bishop Guertin (151) and Pinkerton (152). Rummler was Concord's first finisher in 17th place. Concord again won the Capital City Invitational on October 10th with Johnson, Rummler and Philbrick taking the first three places. This was the 5th straight win by Concord since the race's inception. Concord lost two regular season races to Bishop Guertin and Winnacunnet.

Concord had 5 underclassmen in the top 7 that went to the state meet and Coach Luti felt that 3rd or 4th was the best that they could expect (at least that's what he said to the media; you can rest assured that every Concord runner knew exactly how many runners from Winnacunnet and BG they could allow in front of them). Concord (78) won the race easily over Bishop Guertin (106) and Winnacunnet (121). Concord's runners were Rummler (8), Johnson (13), LaRoche (16), Mamos (20), Underwood (21), Philbrick (31) and Mike Eliasberg (37). Based on the times of teams in the other classes, Concord again expected a 3rd place finish at best in the MOC the following week. But Luti once again worked his magic and Concord (158) won the race over Laconia (158) and Londonderry (171). Concord and Laconia were tied after the top 5 were scored but Concord's 6th man (Eliasberg) beat Laconia's 6th man for the win. Concord's places were Johnson (16), Rummler (29), LaRoche (32), Underwood (39), Mamos (42), Eliasberg (54) and Philbrick (63).

Concord's magic did not continue at the New England race. Concord (251) was the 3rd NH team, placing 7th. Bishop Hendricken, RI (77), Cumberland, RI (115) and Londonderry (195) were the first 3 teams.

This was the last boys cross-country team coached by Bill Luti. His last team was a state champion and he left behind a good core of runners as the 1982 team won the Meet of Champions race (after a sub par race and second place in the Class L race) under new coach Bruce MacMahon.
